Pastor's Page:

Dear Congregation,

We want the happily-ever-after ending. Not all of us may go for the predictable, everything-falls-into-place Hallmark Christmas movie ending where, of course, the once bashful guy and the always beautiful girl finally get together in the center of the town square on Christmas Eve, with the towering tree lit as cotton ball-sized snow gently falls, but we do want to end on a high. At the least, we want a resolve. We prefer one that makes sense.

Yeah. Reality. Here we are. At the end of 2020. Nothing is making sense. There is no resolve. And if most things—or even some things—would fall into place, we'd be good.

As we move into December, which is the time most of you will be reading this Spire edition, we are facing some of the hardest days we've experienced. Nothing compares to this. To actually hear many of you say that loved ones are not coming—or should not come—for Christmas is staggering, sobering, sad. But it's the truth.

This Christmas, if we think like this, is going to hurt.

But we don't have to think like this. Instead, we can look at what we have around us rather than what we want within us.

What we want? Oh, you know. Get back to that Hallmark Christmas movie for a moment. The romance thing may or may not be at the heart of our hearts, but the warmth, the glow, and the comfortable, nostalgic feeling of flannel sheets, fresh-cut Fraser fir boughs, friends and family close, and frosty windows we glance through while holding mugs of hot chocolate in front of a robust fire is something we opt for or compare our lives against.

This year? Ooof. Yeah. As December 2020 is going, or, specifically, as it will go—that toasty, terrific feeling will be faint, if it happens at all.

So, what do we do?

We do what we have always done. We turn to scripture. This year, we really enter it thoroughly. We come to Mary, Joseph and the Innkeeper, we see them not through the frosty glass windows, though. No, this year we see the pain and the grit of a story we've romanced far more than those Hallmark movies. We who have had our plans wrecked really do get what Mary was going through. She's carrying the Son of God. Um. The. Son. Of. God.

Yeah. Whoa. Big time, good time.

But this is neither a big time, nor a good time. This is a young, first time mother faced giving birth in a barn. That's right. A barn.

This could not have been her plan! This was CLEARLY not her desire. If anything, she likely imagined that God, being God, would come through for her with a cozy B and B that included those nice flannel sheets I mentioned. And a master bath, of course—one that had near the floor-to-ceiling windows a super-sized bathtub that requires WAY too much water to fill. And delicious, catered food delivered to the door of her suite by an abundant amount of highly-qualified and deeply caring wait staff.

If the first Christmas was not about comfort, should this one be different?

No, Mary and Joseph were blocked. So was the Innkeeper. Seeing this woman in a very family way and only being able to offer her the barn out back?

As the first Christmas was not ANYTHING like what these three had in mind, ours being what it will be, is in keeping with a God who doesn't give us what we want. He gives us what we need. And what we need in the harsh reality of a harsh year is a God who, through the hardships of it all, brings us Christmas in the most beautiful, unexpected, unpredictable and surprising way with unplanned guests, like those shepherds, who, unannounced, just show up.

If we are going to celebrate Christmas, and yes, we are going to celebrate Christmas, we are going to remember, rekindle and relive that first Christmas. In doing so, we will be all the more blessed in the beauty of knowing, yes, our God wrapped in swaddling clothes, in a baby we'll call Jesus, is with us.

And that, alone, as it should be, is Christmas.

We welcome good news. Here is some! This congregation continues to do what it has done with me since I began working as your pastor, and that's join me in ministry. As a people of God, you watch out for each other. Oh my stars, no, you are NOT perfect at this. No one is—especially me, and you catch this. You truly do. You point me to people or situations that I have missed. You call me to action, care, and love. You do this because you realize that, as the body of Christ, you are equally called to action, to care and to love. You may not phrase this the way I am about to, but consider the obvious: you do pastor during COVID-19. You do go ahead. You do what needs to be done not out of convenience—um, there is a pandemic out there; you do it out of and from Christian love.

As I reflect upon the months we have endured with this virus, and the word endured is the right one, I think of how you have rallied and cared, listened and responded. As this Spire reaches you, consider the calendar. We have days left in this year. This is a call to action for me as it is for you. Too many have endured too much loneliness and hardships this year. Maybe most of us can get by with this for a week, maybe a month, but this prolonged season of separation and fear for our health is weighing us down now that the days keep getting shorter. Thanksgiving is gone. Our tables didn't have the numbers they've had in years past. This is a deep ache, a loss. Christmas is coming. Specifically, Christmas is coming *this year*. You know what this means in your own heart. Imagine what it will feel like for others who, for whatever reason, are just down.

A friend of mine says the best way to get out of the low feelings is to care for others. She does this *tremendously* well. Give her a cause? She IS there. Suggest a way to help someone? She will either expand on that, or, in seconds, come up with an even better, brighter plan. Her mantra can be yours because honestly, it isn't a mantra at all—it's called being Christian.

Reflect on this hymn written by Jason Upton. We sang *They Will Know We Are Christians By Our Love* during worship on November 15th.

We are one in the Spirit We are one in the Lord We are one in the Spirit We are one in the Lord And we pray that all unity May one day be restored

We will work with each other We will work side by side We will work with each other We will work side by side And we'll guard each man's dignity And save each man's pride We will walk with each other We will walk hand in hand We will walk with each other We will walk hand in hand And together we'll spread the news That God is in our land

All praise to the Father From whom all things come And all praise to Christ Jesus His only son And all praise to the Spirit Who makes us one And they'll know we are Christians By our love, By our love Yes, they'll know we are Christians By our love

Be one with God. With your own poor or broken heart, reach out. Minister to others. Care. This is not the Christmas we expected, but it is a Christmas we can embrace. Let us not be so thankful for what we have, but for what we can do. Something big. Something small. Something direct. Something anonymous. Reflect upon a sermon I gave this fall titled *Just do it*. Now don't just reflect, just do it!

In Luke 6:38, Jesus says, "Give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over, will be poured into your lap. For with the measure you use, it will be measured to you."

And here is wisdom, truth and hope found in Proverbs 11:25. "Whoever brings blessing will be enriched, and one who waters will himself be watered." Go and water. Give, and yes, it will be given to you.

It's more than water, what is given to you though, isn't it? The adage that we don't give to receive has never been wrong. Let's just give "Christmas" because we can. Because we should. Because the light in us, however dim sometimes, is, in fact, still light. And it changes darkness immediately.

Our God is with us, fellow pastors. Go, and do. Amen.

- Give praise.



Faith Stories

Our first story this week came to us from Bonnie Love-Colwell. It was a story that reflected on the fact that we need to put it all in God's hands when we can't juggle it all. It was a time when Bonnie was directing a stage production, being a parent and a wife, working teaching every day, and doing online classes. She continued to struggle juggling all of her

responsibilities, so she asked God to take over for her and get her through this time of overbooking her time. As she prayed with her eyes closed, she felt light filtering in and spelled the word trust on her closed eyelid. She said thank you Lord, I will trust you will take care of it. Wouldn't you know that a snowstorm hit Wednesday morning, letting school out early and forcing a cancellation of stage rehearsal, leaving Bonnie time to do the online chat that she needed to be present for. Snow isn't uncommon in January, but the timing couldn't have been any better, This showed Bonnie yet again that she needs to turn it ALL over to God.



Our second story came to us from Karen Jones. Karen tried to record herself, but was too emotional, so she emailed it to the church allowing us to present it. Karen's touching story was about her brother who was injured in a car accident years ago and became disabled. He was in and out of the hospital from the nursing home where he lived, as he was in a very tough state of health. Karen went to visit her brother with her sister and Mom. He was in

pain and they prayed that David would get some peace. Karen went to get beverages for her family and on the way back was joined by a minister, friar, and priest who all asked to pray with them. After they left, she felt that David had a calming look on his face. He didn't miraculously become healed but he did improve enough to leave the hospital in a couple days. This was a reinforcement to her that God was listening and was there for all of them.

Our third story is from Gus. He told about how he fell away from religion in his college years. Then one day a few years later someone or something told him to " listen " to the conversation that was going on in the next booth in the restaurant he was in. The woman's story that day was the beginning of many horrific stories of abortion and all the terrible statistics of how many babies die unnecessarily. This prompted him to look back at his religion and knew that he had to turn back to God to get him through this troublesome time.





Our forth story from Kandy. It all began with Kandy donating a cake to the basket raffle supporting the Stout family. It just so happened that the mom of one of Craig's employees at Aldi won the basket. This was a blessing to the mom as during this time of COVID she wasn't sure what she was going to do special for her younger daughter for her birthday. Kandy wasn't feeling confident about the cake because it was one she had not prepared

before, but after she saw the video that the mom sent and the priceless reaction of her daughter, Kandy was reassured this was meant to be. Later that night as Kandy played a game of words with Friends, lo and behold, the perfect seven letter word that fit was BLESSED. This once again reassured Kandy that everything happened perfectly the way it was supposed to.

Our fifth story this week was from Bonnie. She spoke of a time when she was practicing for a play up at Elk mountain. At the end of every rehearsal director Bob DeLuca always ended with the same words "okay see you." This time he ended it with "okay drive safe." Bonnie happened to notice the change in the words but went on her way. Bonnie headed home alone, winding down the curvy road from Elk mountain. She was probably going faster than she should have been when she heard a voice from the passenger seat tell her " you're not in

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any sort of a hurry are you?". She immediately slowed down and around the next curve stood a deer in the middle of the road. Had Bonnie not heard this voice of this angel in the passenger seat, something terrible could have happened that night. Bonnie shares that she feels many times Angels lift us up and set us back down so we can safely go on our way and we don't even realize it.

Our sixth story is from Linda in her camper straight into our hearts. Linda told us she has had so many God moments that she can't count them all. She reminded us that we can go to him no matter what we look like, what our problem is, no matter what we are asking. She remembered Pastor Baker brought them a loaf of bread when they first moved here. Not knowing it was the

Pastor that day, she was impressed that he was able to show God's love without reading any scripture....that loaf of banana bread and the visit was all he needed to do to spread the goodness of God. Linda reminded us again that through all the trials that you may face, if you look to him, he will be there for you.

Our seventh story if from Ray. Ray has had many health issues in the past year. The tests and waiting for results have been very stressful. During a worship service he heard a very helpful scripture. He shares this scripture with us. Philippians 4:6-7 "⁶ Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. ⁷ And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and

your minds in Christ Jesus. "He keeps that scripture near his chair and goes to God with his request and concerns and knows that God has his situation in His control and feels peace.

Our last story is from Kay. She speaks of her son that has served seven years of a 25-30 year prison sentence. He recently met with the parole board to see if he would receive parole. His request was denied. Kay relates that she knows that God is in control of this situation and He will continue to care for her son where he is.

Sometimes we get caught up in waiting for that special time with the Holy Spirit. We wait and we wait sometimes impatiently, thinking that this is never going to happen or I'll never have this "God moment " but lo and behold right in front of you things could be happening that you don't even realize that are happening to protect you and to bless you and to bring you closer to Him.

As we continue to see and hear these stories, let us all dig deep in our memories to remember those moments where the Holy Spirit has been with you or led you to what you need. Have prayerful conversations with him and share with him your joys and problems. Ask Him for guidance in this time of decision of what you will do toward the serving Him this year through your gifts and talents. When you include the Holy Spirit in this discussion, he will be a part of your commitment throughout the year. We continue to enjoy these stories that have been presented by our congregation. We encourage you to have that prayerful time with your God and share your stories with us. Continue to have that time with him and ask him what direction you will go this year in your time and talents and your pledges for this year's crucial stewardship Drive. May God bless you on your journey.

Thank you all for your dedication to this church and all of it's missions. Together with God's guidance we will continue to find new and exciting ways to serve our Gracious and Generous God!

We hope you are finding these stories helpful in your own journey. The Stewardship committee hopes that these are bringing you closer to God and perhaps sometimes answering some questions along the way.

A friendly reminder that if you haven't turned in your pledge cards and time and talent sheets, there's still time to have that discussion with your Lord to guide you in your way of serving him. Remember that it takes ALL of us to work together for that common goal of service to God and to do ALL we do for HIS GLORY!

God Bless you all and we pray that God continues to bless this church, when so many other churches are struggling, sometimes consolidating, sometimes closing. But we continue to find ways to serve.

The Partnership in Hope administrator will be notified that this money is coming.

Willing Worker Big Group Meeting - November 4, 2020

Two thank you notes were read; one from benefit committee and one from the Stout family.

OLD BUSINESS: Maureen and Connie Breese met at Nicholson Lumber to look for cupboards for the Gathering Room. They ordered cupboards (with a lazy Susan for the corner cupboard). Nicholson Lumber came and measured. The cost is \$2,900 plus installation. Maureen also had them measure for a cabinet under the bathroom counter in the lady's bathroom so that the TP etc. could be put out of sight. She arranged to pay for that cupboard herself. Trustees are to be asked to do something with the 2 dehumidifiers that are under the counter. These cupboards will be for Willing Worker storage so that big coffee pots and other things don't have to be hauled up and down the cellar steps.

Holli reported that the total costs for the cancer benefit lunch were \$634.69. Bills to be given to the treasurer. Cole slaw (Binghams) and much of pork butt (Stepniaks) were donated.

Kandy received a note from Jason Miller in response to her letter. The Harford Fair board had received her letter asking about the possibility of us putting a building on the fair grounds as the area in the new building is too small. They asked how big a building we were considering (to have a comparable space to the log cabin, we would need 300-400 square feet). A new building of that size might be \$8,000. We would still have to pay for electric usage. There are a number of questions if we went that route. If we went with two spaces in the new building, we might not be able to sell everything that we sold before. Then what if there was no fair next year? How would we recoup our losses if we had built a building and there was no fair? Perhaps the congregation could be asked if they have a large storage shed that they no longer want and would donate.

Holli gave an update on the roast beef dinner. Ticket sales are going slowly. Job assignments: Ellengreen beans, Kandy-corn, Ginny-potatoes, Holli-gravy, Peggy and crew-pie cutting, Ivie and Dena to help package. Cole slaw and dinner rolls will be purchased. Holli will buy the eye of round beef and cook it in roasters. She has checked with Sam's and Stepniaks. Other suggestions were to contact a restaurant to see if we could get their price for meat. Pies need to be there by noon. Still need: traffic control, ticket checker in, meal taker outer, dippers, clean up crew, and ?

NEW BUSINESS: JoAnn asked about the left-over roast beef in the freezer for Alyssa's wedding reception. She may take it with our blessing.

Sharon Decker made a motion that our pledge for next year be \$3,000 plus \$350 to OCWM. 2nd by Maureen. Passed. Reasoning was amount in treasury and no fair profits this year plus who knows about next year. A possibility of us giving more next year at this time if we have a good year.

The next meeting is February 3, 2021 at 1:00PM in the Lecture Hall.

NOVEMBER'S PASTOR'S REPORT: Understandably, people long to "go back" to our lives before the virus. I think that's a mistake in thinking because this virus, especially when we consider God in control, has taught (and will continue to teach) us a great deal. The lessons unfold.

I have heard at the double glass doors after worship, "I just couldn't stand being away," or "I have missed church." I get it. I think we all get it. I'm not diminishing these heart-felt, true and honest feelings. The glory of God by way of the Holy Spirit *is* in that sanctuary. I feel it all the time. So do others! It's awesome!

I do invite us to think long and hard about what worship is, or, more specifically, where worship "ends." To begin, we all know this. Worship does not end. It is not contained. It is FAR from being one hour each week.

When we remember Pentecost, we know the Spirit of God ripped off that roof. God is ripping (yes, like many of you, I think this may not be the right verb, either) something new in us and something new for us. We cannot go back. We should not go back. In conversations, I have said this virus and our lives after it will forever be changed. I'm comparing apples to oranges here, but I knew a life before 9/11 and I know one post 9/11. The two are *vastly* different. There is a definite loss in our post 9/11 lives. Now in speaking from loss, I hope there will be a gain in our post virus lives.

NOVEMBER'S PASTOR'S REPORT Continued:

The gain is that we truly value each other. We recognize we need God in our group. We also recognize our group is not limited. The same number of people sitting in the same seats does not welcome the stranger, the newcomer, or the seasoned Christian who has, for one reason or another, relocated.

We have been forced to consider what a community actually is. This has been hard on us. It continues to be hard on us. I'm actually glad this is hard on us in one way because being a bit uncomfortable aligns with the theology of carrying our own crosses. I have yet to read in scripture where the Christian life is the easy life. The Christian life is the blessed life, most definitely. However, it is not—and never will be and likely never should be—easy.

As of November, 2020, I have done more writing for you than any other year. This is due, in part, to the completion of the doctoral studies. Without all those papers, you have more access to me as a different me. That program changed me and changed how I see my ministry with yours here in Harford.

I do not regret showing you how the sermons form each week. Rather than the big presentation behind the pulpit Sunday only, I offer each week a tremendous amount of work. I start us all on Mondays with the sermon intro. My intent here is not only to intro the upcoming Sunday text, but to take the Word of God to a place you may not have considered (or can perhaps reconsider). Tuesday, I typically record the vlog. This? Yikes! This IS hard. I aim these short videos not only at those close to Christ, but also to those struggling in an identity with Christ. Our scripture is alive. Its timelessness reaches us every time we engage it, and my goal, as your pastor, is to have people near and not so near the church get the Gospel truth—our God is love. Our relationship with Him does bring healing and wellness of the soul. And yes, Jesus died on the cross so that death would never be known to you. Wednesday brings the Midweek Meditation, a nugget of truth and application to get us moving ahead practically. Thursday, I share the weekly column published in *The* Susquehanna Independent, and either Friday or Saturday, depending on the weekly schedule, I give you the Sermon Prep. This is yet another way to get you into the layers of the text. Lately, I've been giving one last spark to the week. It's my invitation to you, the congregation, and to the "congregation" who can join us virtually. This fact remains sobering. Harford is not growing demographically. If this church is to survive this ongoing, local economic downturn, we need resources far beyond a 20- to 30-mile radius of our physical address on the Creek Road. It is my intent to reach these resources—and that seems like a marketing/bling word for people, our people; yet, in making disciples in all nations, we (you and I) are called to bring them home to Harford, one soul at a time. Currently, we have almost 350 Facebook members. Over 200 of them are active enough on this page to respond to any single post.

On a different note, and I'm using this as a pun, the music through this virus season during worship has been, in my opinion, fantastic. This is not praise for the musicians as much as it is for God working in and through all of us. I just spoke with a current shut-in who misses singing in the choir. (And the choir IS missed, right?) Until this return, the Spirit of God is lifting the sanctuary off the ground. So much truth, so much honesty, so much shared emotion and deep, soul-opening expression is heard weekly. Of course, this positively impacts the message behind the pulpit. Our God IS good.

Our God IS good. In this report, I mention this virus like it's some far off fact, but it keeps getting closer. More and more of those we know are getting it. The number of Americans who have died from it, and the number of people around the world who have died from it, makes us not just weak, but truly mournful. Our world is in acute grief. Be mindful of this when you pray.

NOVEMBER'S PASTOR'S REPORT Continued:

Be mindful of Christmas, too. Keep this season lit, as challenging as it may be. This first sermon series I've done since mid-March, titled *Unmasking Christmas*, is key. It's timely. I know this series was launched in early November, but, as I have said in church, we need all this time this year to truly understand afresh and anew the meaning of Emmanuel, God with us. As I shared in my pastor's report here in this edition, this is not the year we Christians are comfortable. Mary, Joseph, the Innkeeper and even the traveling shepherds did not experience comfort either. Not by any means. As we embrace Christ with us, we also embrace a dark world that does at times keep us in uncomfortable situations, even seasons. By no means does this mean Christ has abandoned us. It's the contrary. We see in our suffering and the suffering of those around us the presence of Christ pushing us to love much more boldly, connect (safely) much more deliberately, and hold what can seem like fleeting hope much more intentionally.

I'll close with this. It's a tremendously stressful time to be a pastor. I thank God we are in this ministry together. No, we are not perfect in this practice. Nevertheless, God still reaches us and teaches us. God still (and always) inspires us and gifts us. Let these gifts you experience be shared. Love out loud. And do this love—this great, endless, awesome love—in His name.
