Lent? ...What is Lent?

Lent is a 40-day season in the Church Calendar beginning Ash Wednesday and ending on Easter Sunday. Lent is observed on Wednesdays, but Sundays during Lent are treated as 'Little Easters', and not counted as part of Lent. During this time, we focus on what Jesus did to win our salvation. He lived a perfect life and died for us under God's wrath. His sacrifice shows the true horror of our sins and moves us to turn from them.

But Why is Lent 40 Days?

The 40 days of Lent are taken from Christ's 40-day experience in the wilderness (Matthew 4:1-11). Here He faced off with the devil as our Champion, overcoming three temptations common to all mankind...

First, Christ was tempted to doubt God's loving care and thus to satisfy His needs Himself -- but instead Christ looks to God's Word and directs us back to trusting in God.

Do you face temptation?

Are you tempted to doubt God, or to believe things about God that the Bible says are not true, or even to forsake God? Do you give in to this temptation?

Turn to Christ this Lenten Season! He is your Champion!

Second, by Satan's mishandling of Scripture, Christ was tempted to false belief in God -- but Christ dismisses such self-righteous spiritualism as tempting God, and reminds us of the need to seek out true Scriptural teaching.

Finally, Christ was tempted to forsake God in return for worldly pleasures, powers, and possessions -- but Christ forcefully rejects this notion as a ridiculous exchange of the priceless for the worthless, of a relationship with God for eternal separation from Him.

And Why is Lent so Important?

• It shows us the true result of our sins ... they separate us from a righteous and just God.

During Lent, we contemplate our sinful condition and need for a Saviour -- a man who is Holy in His nature and who lived a sinless life. In our natural condition, we are stained with an evil, fallen nature and are incapable of the perfect sinlessness required by God. As a result, all human effort fails to please God, we cannot have a relationship with Him, and we don't deserve one.

• It shows us the only payment for sin that God could accept ... the death of His Son.

Though we are undeserving, God in His Grace desires a relationship with us. To accomplish this, He sent His Son, Jesus Christ, to live among us as a human. Because Jesus is God, He has the Holy nature we don't have, and lived a perfectly sinless life the way we never could. And, in obedience to God the Father, Jesus -- that is, God the Son -- willingly went to the cross, took upon Himself the sin of the whole world, and suffered for us sin's penalty: separation from God and death.

• It shows us the extent of God's Love ...by His Grace, through Faith in Jesus Christ, forgiveness of sins, life and salvation are ours for eternity. Jesus was innocent of the sin He carried for us, and the penalty He suffered held no power over Him. Thus, He was reconciled with His Heavenly Father and returned to life. Through faith in Christ, we are granted this blessing as well. He was Holy for us, He was perfect for us, He suffered the penalty of sin for us, and it is by faith alone -- not by our works, but by the finished work of Jesus Christ -- that we have forgiveness of sins, we are given a new, holy nature, we are reconciled with God, and at the Resurrection we will be given a new body that is unstained by sin.

LENT 2019 asks SEVEN ESSENTIAL QUESTIONS



Both lifelong Christians and people on the edges of the church have some of the same basic questions about life and faith. Lent is the

perfect time to explore these questions, leading up to the big question that is answered with Easter: is there hope for life and life beyond death?

Week One: Who Is Jesus? Matthew 16:13-16

Every person needs to grapple with Jesus' question to his disciples, "Who do you say that I am?" Christians believe he is "the Christ, the son of the living God."

Week Two: What Matters Most? Mark 12:28-34

Relationships—with God and others—matter most.

Week Three: Am I Accepted? John 8:1-11

Even with our flaws, Jesus loves and accepts us as beloved children of God.

Week Four: Where Is God? John 1:1-5, 14

Although God is not limited to working through people, God primarily works though human instruments.

Week Five: What Brings Fulfillment? John 13:1-5, 13-17

True fulfillment comes from serving others.

Week Six: What about Suffering? Matthew 27:27-31

(Palm/Passion Sunday) Although God does not prevent suffering, the crucified God fully enters human suffering and works to redeem that suffering.

Week Seven: Is There Hope? Matthew 28:1-7

(Easter) Jesus Christ's resurrection gives us hope for life and even hope for death.

This freebie will cost you, not your neighbor

"Why can't we do this?" During a meeting with the Deacons around five years ago, this spirited soul was following through with her brainstorm idea that we, the church, host a free dinner for the community.

We didn't do this five years ago. Maybe we hadn't grown enough as a church to extend the radical hospitality Jesus seeks in His followers. Maybe we hadn't learned that in God's economy there always is enough, and, unlike the widow at Zarephath (1 Kings 17), we can give not from any abundance we may have, but from hearts of generosity for our neighbors. Maybe we hadn't learned that love is something when we give it away.

What is clear to me over the past five years is what we have learned. We have learned that God wants us to move into the community. God wants us to build relationships beyond those in and around the church community we know. God wants us to give joyfully, not begrudgingly, and this upcoming Free Community Dinner on March 30 from 5 to 7 PM provides us the opportunity to do what Christ did for those He met, and that was serve them.

It's finally here. Thankfully, we didn't have to wander for forty years in the wilderness like the Israelites with Moses; we did it in five. We are entering a Promised Land which is not filled with milk and honey per se; instead, our Promised Land is filled with spaghetti, sauce, drinks and desserts.

This is exciting! When we pray for our church to grow, this is *exactly* what happens. God brings us to a point where we realize who we are—*exactly*, and this means we are doers of the Word. The only way we become doers of the Word is because we know the Word does not bind us to worry, but releases us to abundant grace and overflowing mercy in the form of generosity.

This community dinner *is* free to our guests, but it will cost you. I am not talking about covering the cost of the meal; no, that's taken care of through our Community Outreach Fund; I'm talking about what it will cost you to call on a neighbor who doesn't know where you worship, or the neighbor you either do not know, have not seen in a long while. Yikes! I'm even talking about a neighbor you may not like.

You can likely anticipate the immediate response your neighbors may have to a free dinner held in the Lecture Hall. The excuses to not come can pile up faster than the number of times the New England Patriots have won a Super Bowl. But this is where you step in, or maybe stand firm in your sincere, gentle, and endearing invitation. Offer to pick them up and take them, or make it a dinner date by setting a time when you'll meet them there. Let them know God's love in your words and in your care.

There is no catch to this. There is no ploy to get your unreligious neighbor or family member to get to our church, or to sway another churchgoer from their church to consider worship in Harford. Nope. From our abundance in Christ, this is just a time to gather, sit, break bread together, and be the community center this community without a center needs.

You're going to have to give, and this doesn't mean you open your wallet. It means you open your heart.

The Deacon I mentioned left our church and is now out of state. I wonder what would have happened had we rallied with her five years ago. You may now wonder this, too. Let's not wonder too long, however. Instead, let's honor her spirit and her spunk and the God she follows and do what we are called to do—love our neighbors.

SCOUT SUNDAY WORSHIP FEBRUARY 3, 2019

We were excited to have Cub Scouts from pack 98 and Boy Scouts from Troop 98 part of our Worship Service. It is longstanding tradition to celebrate Scout Sunday on the first Sunday of February. The boys were multitaskers that day, as we had them start out by being Greeters at both entrances. Then they were pressed into being Acolytes. After lighting the candles, the Scouts then presented the colors, advancing the flags of the United States of America and the State of Pennsylvania to the front of the sanctuary. We then all joined in singing the National anthem. The Scouts then recited their oath .After the choir sang their anthem, the Scouts joined me up front for some questions . First on the agenda was to recognize Ben Galvin on his attaining the rank of Eagle Scout. On behalf of the church, I congratulated him and presented him with a gift. I then asked Ben if he had any words of encouragement for the scouts that were seated next to him. March 31 the Catholic Choir and Mt View Chimettes will be performing in the sanctuary at 3PM. Each group was asked to provide 5 dozen cookies.

Stewardship Minutes January 17, 2019

Pastor Will opened with prayer reading Luke Chapter 2 asking how we see and find salvation.

There is a date change of the church service in the lecture hall. It will be held on February 24 followed by "food and fellowship". Meat will be provided by the Deacons with covered dishes brought by the attendees to round out the meal.

Julie explained and answered questions concerning her thorough and comprehensive financial report for the past year. Despite having some hefty expenditures at the end of the year, Julie looks to 2019 with confidence in the church's ability to meet our financial obligations. Some of the categories in the 2018 budget were over budget while others were considerably under budget.

Julie opened a discussion of how we might invest the church's money into a more lucrative fund than a bank savings account.

Some questions and concerns included:

- 1. Should we have a financial planner?
- 2. Do other churches have financial planners? Will was going to check with Bonnie Bates, Penn N.E. Conference Minister.
- 3. What fees are charged and how much are they?
- 4. We need to be able to make withdrawals; are there fees when money is withdrawn?
- 5. Should we take out CD's, is there a minimum amount which must be invested?

Peg Empet will contact several financial investors for information on what each offers which we can discuss and decide and suggest the best route for the church's investments.

A Pay Pal account will be set up for the convenience of those who wish to contribute money online.

The remainder of the meeting centered on the annual meeting January 27 during which we will gather ideas for future goals of the church. Stewardship decided that dividing into small groups of approximately 10 with a facilitator and recorder would be the best way to accomplish this. In a 10-15 minute session, each participant will have the opportunity to list goals on a sheet of paper, indicating their top priority. These suggestions and comments will be presented at the February Stewardship meeting. The February Spire will include the goals and priorities suggested by the annual meeting attendees.

"Recognition Sunday", an outreach idea of Stewardship, was decided upon to recognize individuals and/or groups with the church or community on the first Sunday of each month throughout 2019.

Kay asked once again for us to develop a church calendar of monthly events throughout the year. The calendar serves as a reminder and schedule of upcoming events. With Kay's persistence and guidance, we "got 'er done".

Will closed the meeting with prayer before we set of safely for home as snow was beginning to fall.

The meeting ended in prayer. Next meeting is March 4th at 6:30


St. Patrick's Day

Leprechauns, fairies, banshees, goblins, and many other magical creatures are woven into the folklore and legends of Ireland. Ireland is known as the Emerald Isle. Shamrocks, a three leaf plant, is said to have been used by St. Patrick to represent the trinity.



St. Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland began his life in Britain. He was taken at age 16 by Irish raiders and sold into slavery in Ireland. He escaped after six years and was reunited with his family. He read a letter from a book entitled, Confessio. While reading the letter he seemed to hear the Irish calling him to walk once more with them. He felt he was inadequate to the task because of shortcomings in his education. He eventually did return to Ireland and wandered far and wide baptizing and confirming with great zeal.

There are many legends surrounding St. Patrick. One of the most famous is he drove the snakes of Ireland into the sea and that is why Ireland has no snakes to this day. On this St. Patrick's Day, "May the luck o' the Irish be with you."
