# **Pastor's Page**

#### What ARE we doing? The need for a Mission Statement.

Moses had one. "So now, go. I am sending you to Pharaoh to bring my people the Israelites out of Egypt (Ex 3:10)."

The judges all had one. Here is Gideon's, for example: "Go in the strength you have and save Israel out of Midian's hand. Am I not sending you? (Jud 6:14)."

Jesus had one. "For the Son of Man came to seek and to save what was lost. (Lk 19:10)."

Peter and Paul had one. "For God, who was at work in the ministry of Peter as an apostle to the Jews, was also at work in my ministry as an apostle to the Gentiles. (Gal 2:8)."

Jesus gave his disciples one. "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age. (Mt 28:19-20; see also Mk 16:15)."

What did they all have? Mission statements.

Let me ask you, did you know we had a mission statement? Could you recite all of its 75-words?

Every significant character you meet in the pages of Scripture had a mission, a calling, but it wasn't just individuals who were commissioned. God's groups were also given their tasks to perform. Israel was expected to travel from Egypt to the Promised Land. Under David and Solomon, the Hebrews were tasked to build the temple. The exiles in Babylon were charged to return to their homeland and rebuild. The Jerusalem church was assigned the task of reaching Hebrews with the gospel while the Antioch church focused exclusively on the Gentiles. The church in Philippi understood the care and feeding of Paul to be one of its prime responsibilities.

None of these biblical characters and/or groups launched into ministry with a bland and generic assignment to "go forth and do lots of good works." They weren't commanded to be "nice" or focus their efforts wherever they were inclined or opportunity arose. Rather, they were given specific tasks to accomplish at certain times and in particular situations for defined groups of people.

If we want to be biblical, if we trust the biblical model, then we are required to take the subject of "mission" seriously, seek God's will regarding our mission, and focus on that mission for all we're worth.

Let me give an example of what a church's mission is. I know a church where a high percentage of the members are involved in the medical profession-doctors, nurses, hospital administrators, pharmacists, dentists, and opticians. Taking God's gifting seriously, recognizing that God has gathered these particular members with these particular skills together as a church for a reason, the church lives out its commitment to Christ by focusing on ministries related to the medical field. As a church, we've been blessed, so blessed. One blessing is the mission statement that has sustained us for many, many years:

The Mission of this Congregation and its Minister shall be to worship God, spread the gospel of Jesus Christ, celebrate the sacraments and be involved in Christian Fellowship for people of all ages and backgrounds within the congregation and the community. As Christians at First Congregational Church, we are called to love, uphold and encourage each other, realizing that as we meet our diverse needs, there will be costs, joys and rewards in our faithful discipleship.

How grateful we should be that we've had a mission statement in place! It has helped sustain us in a world today where our youngest citizens are skeptical of or look down on "the institution."

This one is also an identity statement. The second sentence tells us (and the world) who we are and what we are to do. It even shares that there will be costs, joys and rewards.

#### What does a mission statement do, and how do we know it's working?

Good questions! What a mission statement does is align and define us. Given our church's size and location, we aren't going to feed and shelter the homeless in downtown Philadelphia. We aren't going to supply Native Americans in the prairie states with school supplies for their children. Through the UCC, we can HELP the homeless in Philly and add to the school supplies sent to Native American children living in middle America. To help on larger scale mission projects is why we belong to the denomination. But the mission statement we have helps us discern what God's *specific* ministry for our church is.

How do we know if it's working? We will see its effects firsthand with tangible and intangible goals clearly set in place. What doesn't work gets quieted. What does work gets our energy.

Headed up by the Stewardship Committee, we will be asked to establish goals that spring from our new mission statement which has been streamlined from what existed. Again, our existing mission statement served us well, but this church's 218-year-old staying power is attributed to its adaptability. We are more mobile now in that we are responsive to the pressing needs of our community, our country and our world which evolves. Successful mission statements today need to be succinct, measurable and memorable. The one your Stewardship Committee voted into place is

#### Reaching up to God and reaching out to people.

What will this look like? We decide! With our Congregational polity in place, we will work together—all of us—to discern exactly what God is calling us to do. It is His church, not ours. His desires for us will continue to be made known.

NOTE: We aren't *changing* anything. We are simply being attentive, active and responsive to the ministries we succeed at doing well and, Lord willing, will continue to do for His Kingdom on earth.



#### Article from Penn NorthEast weekly newsletter:

# Don't let anyone look down on you because you are young, but set an example for the believers in speech, in conduct, in love, in faith and in purity." ~1 Timothy 4:12

Yesterday teens from across the country joined together in a "walk out" at 10:00 am for 17 minutes. Each minute represented a life lost during the mass shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida on February 14th, 2018. Some of our PNEC youth joined with other students in districts across our conference area. The National School "walk out" was a time for the students to honor and remember the lives lost, and a way for them to nationally (and globally) let their voices be heard.

Area School districts that allowed the walk out to be student lead were proud and overwhelmed at the maturity shown by the students of their schools. Emmaus High School allowed the walk out to be student lead, and the students spoke up and remembered in peaceful way. PNEC Students from 3 different districts (Whitehall/Coplay, Northampton, and Catasauqua) reported their walk outs to be a time of silence, reflection, prayer, and remembrance. LCTI students formed the number 17 and held up pictures of the 17 victims to honor them and remember.

Some districts walked alongside the students and helped them. Parkland High School helped the students to allow it to be a time of education and exploration for the students. Parkland has also been working tirelessly on their Parkland for Parkland Campaign.

Not all the school districts agreed with the walk out. Salisbury School District, for example, did not allow the students to walk out, but the district is encouraging the community to participate in what they are calling, "What's your 17?"

Not everyone agrees with the students walking out of school. As adults we have various opinions as to the best way for their voices to be heard. Yet, we do not walk in their shoes. We look at things from so many different angles. We have so much life experience that gets in our way of seeing through their eyes. We should be proud that our youth are finding their own way to have their voices be heard. Their own way to gather. And, when you really think about it, the only time our teens are gathered together, in one place, all at the same time, Nationwide, is at School.

May we continue to pray, continue to remember, and let us join our youth and take action. Allow yourself to be open the the spirit's leading, to speak up, to write letters, to Walk Up or to Walk Out. No matter what you feel called to do, it is time for us all to make a difference in our world. For us to join together to make sure our children and youth are safe. And, as always, we need to continue to encourage our youth to be able to live up to their callings and to lead by example.




#### Prayer Bears
