Absence Makes The Heart Grow Fonder: Who will we be?

Dear Congregation,

What we are learning about God and ourselves during this time is tremendous. What has been taken from us, which has been our custom and ritual of gathering at the church, enables us to see what—exactly—we value in our church, in our worship, and in our Christian community.

Maybe now we can start to see with clarity what it means to be "church." Given this time we have had, we can begin to discuss what it means to worship. We can also have active conversations about what it means to be a part of our community as Christians.

I don't hold the answers singularly. This is collective. We all have a say here.

This being said, I welcome conversation with you. The questions that follow may help us learn about how Christ is directing His bride, the Church. Here they are.

Without the church being as assessable as it has been, what have you learned?

Where are our strengths?

What are we missing?

There have certainly been losses, but are their places where we experienced any gains?

If so, what were those gains?

No one would suggest—let alone agree to—a church "experimenting" with going to online services only. THAT would be CRAZY. This has happened though, and the information we have as a whole cannot be tossed away. Absence does make the heart grow fonder, so, in this absence, what will be held so much more fondly?

Consider with me having round table discussions later this year. Nothing needs to be formalized churchwide per se, but exchanging our experiences, gains, and losses with intentionality can certainly prepare us for effective, compassionate, inclusive, and vital ministry in the days ahead. God has provided us with a great deal of valuable information. Let's use it!

I'm including the column I wrote recently in *The Susquehanna Independent* because it speaks to how we will make our way in a post pandemic world. Some of us have enjoyed the quieter aspects of these past few months. It's like the winter snow day that went on and on (and on). It will be time to gather again, however, and our diverse experiences of the pandemic will equip us with the information we need to be the church we are called to be.

We decide how we live Post-Covid lives

Even though the county will officially move to yellow this week, you may be one of the angry people out there. After all, some lament, our rights have been taken away for too long! The argument goes that the government shouldn't decide when this shelter in place bit should end and non-essential businesses should open. This is up to us!

I will tell you what—exactly—is up to us. How we live our lives when this pandemic becomes a memory will be ours. No one can order, mandate or write how this will be for us. We will do this collectively.

As 9/11 changed the world, this virus will present a similar outcome. In the wake of this heart-crushing, crippling time of great loss, what we do will be up to us.

We decide how this will change us. What will we carry when pocket-sized hand sanitizers go by the wayside? In addition to the masks, what will we let go? There are deeper questions. What will we remember? What will we value? How will life change?

On May 15, the CDC reported that 86,607 people have died from this virus. Globally, that number is 302,493. This tremendous impact will forever inform us, but again it is up to us individually and collectively to decide what we'll do with this information.

Maybe we will learn to run less and listen more. Maybe we will learn to spend extra minutes with the ones we love. Maybe we will learn to appreciate the paper goods aisle in our grocery stores. Maybe we will remember what it feels like to send and receive a smile when not wearing a facemask.

There is much more to do, too. We should consider how we are going to mourn collectively all those who have died, and, in turn, salute all those who have experienced and endured such hardship because of social distancing and sheltering in place.

I wrote a moment ago about 9/11, which, of course, is an actual date. Understandably, this pandemic won't have an "anniversary date" per se, but we cannot just move forward without looking back at what this pain and loss has brought and taught us.

These past few months have changed us as Americans and as individuals. This has certainly changed the church, the locus of this column. Having completed my dissertation on online worship a month ago, I propose we do not "just go back" to what was. As believers are called to fish for people, we have experienced gains with sharing worship to those who are unchurched or consider themselves distant from a church via screens. This should not stop. If anything, how to reach the world with Jesus' message needs to continue.

This window of opportunity God has given all of us to share our faith with others during this often harsh and always limiting time cannot be ignored, downplayed or marginalized. In the name of Christ, the value of gathering cannot be glossed over, or forgotten.

Instead, our worshiping and our connecting virtually must be discussed and considered. These new ways of sharing and living into the gospel message shouldn't be far-off dreams but implemented into the reality before us when we are much more conveniently connected.

When this season upon us does become a memory, I pray we do not say, "I forget how bad it was." Rather, I pray we continue to make what was so hard so affirming (if not beautiful) in our collective future. These lessons from loss can lead to greater love tomorrow. Let's make this happen not just with intentionality, but heart.

Memorial Day

We honor Memorial Day traditionally as the day we Americans honor those who've made the ultimate sacrifice. As Christians, we remember the One who made the ultimate sacrifice so that, regardless of the battle, death would never again win.

Today, as we remember our fallen soldiers, let's look to and remember the cross with new meaning, deeper appreciation, and endless love for our Savior because those nails in our Savior's hands and feet make this freedom timelessly clear: sin no longer has its hold on us. The war between ourselves and sin is over. Our lives with Jesus will never end.

This year, we also honor all active servicemen and women. These men and women work diligently every hour of the day to protect the freedoms many Americans have died to secure for each and everyone of us. The call to justice is still being heard, responded to, and acted upon with brave hearts, determination, and dedication. The love of our nation under God is still, and always, a priority.

Today, we say thank you to those who've made the ultimate sacrifice and to those men and women who continue to serve and keep our country free.

Let us pray this prayer which was written by Austin Fleming:

Hear Our Prayer This Day

In the quiet sanctuaries of our own hearts, let each of us name and call on the One whose power over us is great and gentle, firm and forgiving, holy and healing ...

You who created us, who sustain us, who call us to live in peace, hear our prayer this day.

Hear our prayer for all who have died, whose hearts and hopes are known to you alone ...

Hear our prayer for those who put the welfare of others ahead of their own and give us hearts as generous as theirs ...

Hear our prayer for those who gave their lives in the service of others, and accept the gift of their sacrifice ...

Help us to shape and make a world where we will lay down the arms of war and turn our swords into ploughshares for a harvest of justice and peace ...

Comfort those who grieve the loss of their loved ones and let your healing be the hope in our hearts...



MESSAGE FROM Bonnie Bates

Hello friends,

A couple things have come into to mind and awareness that I want to share with you this week. The first is the need for us to continue to be cautious about the decisions we make: about gathering, about mission, about our public and private stances on issues. These are really difficult times, but the times are not the same for all of us. One of the UCC Daily Devotionals from Vince Amlin reminded me, and I hope will you, that we all come from different places and perspectives in this time of pandemic. Here are his words: The Same Boat, Vince Amlin, May 18, 2020

"The soldiers' plan was to kill the prisoners ... but the centurion ordered those who could swim to jump overboard first and make for the land, and the rest to follow, some on planks and others on pieces of the ship.

And so it was that all were brought safely to land." - Acts 27:42-44, excerpted (NRSV)

"Some say we're all in the same boat during this pandemic. But as this story from Acts shows, even people in the same boat aren't in the same boat.

Some can swim; some can't. Some have decision-making power; some don't. Some have just been saved from death; others are still heading to their executions. Not the same boat.

When I pray with members of my congregations who still have to leave their homes every day to do work that is unsafe, I know we're not in the same boat.

When I hear my friends Kaji and Donna describe ministry in New York City, where, as I write, almost 1 in 400 people has died, I know we're not in the same boat.

When I see that black citizens of Chicago are dying at 6-times the rate of whites, I know.

We are not even in the same storm.

Paul himself offers a different model of solidarity.

"Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep."

Rather than claiming we're in the same boat, the gospel tells me to find out about my neighbor's boat. Seek to understand their experience of this storm.

And listen when they tell me what I can never understand.

It prompts me to ask how we ended up in such different boats.

And do something about it. And not stop until everyone is brought safely to land."

This was a good reminder for me. I hope it is for you as well.

Items of information from Bonnie Bates, President of Penn Northeast Conference: 2020-05-21

From Penn Northeast Conference:

Beloved Penn Northeast Conference congregations, Grace, Mercy, Peace and a little of the Wisdom of Solomon to you all!

I needed clothes. And you gave them to me. I was sick. And you took care of me. I was in prison. And you came to visit me.' "Then the people who have done what is right will answer him. 'Lord,' they will ask, 'when did we see you hungry and feed you? When did we see you thirsty and give you something to drink? When did we see you as a stranger and invite you in? When did we see you needing clothes and give them to you? When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you?'

- Matthew 25:36-39

"All things are lawful for me," but not all things are beneficial...Let no one seek their own, but the well-being of our neighbor.

- 1 Corinthians 10:23-24

It feels strange to make a recommendation about when to resume in-person worship to our beloved congregations. Nevertheless, we feel it is our covenantal responsibility to offer the following recommendations knowing that each of you may well have different considerations and pressures which guide your decision-making process.

We offer these in prayerful encouragement as you discern your congregation's future, knowing that your decisions may include struggling with your future ministry.

Our UCC focus is on Love of Neighbor, Love of Children and Love of Creation.

As we reopen our congregations to gathering, it is love of neighbor and love of each other which form the basis of these considerations. We also want to point out that what is legally allowed may actually conflict with what is best for you and your congregation. For instance, is it in the best interest of the safety and health of your congregation and your neighbors to reopen, even if the authorities give permission? Should we reopen quickly, fearful that if we do not our congregation will not survive? Would this not expose greater numbers of people to exposure to COVID-19, affecting the welfare of the very people we are trying to reach with the good news of God's love? Our neighbors and our communities will be observing what we as congregations choose to do.

With these tensions in mind, we offer the following recommendations which also take into account Pennsylvania's planned three stage opening and the current CDC guidelines.

- •Churches that have been worshipping and ministering virtually should continue this ministry even when it is prudent to worship in person as well.
- •When you do resume in-person worship, please remember that it will not be the worship experience you had prior to the COVID-19 pandemic. Implementing measures to mitigate and reduce the spread of COVID-19 is an expectation of our members, the public and our state public health guidelines.
- •Live in covenant with each other by planning and implementing mitigation measures before you choose to resume in-person worship and other ministries. A plan needs to address who should not attend in-person, how to ensure a safe and clean worship environment, and how to meet current public health protocols for gatherings of people.
- •Involve the Pastor, the congregational staff, the congregational leadership, health care professionals and others in your congregation in developing this plan.
 - •Take a breath. Pause. Discern. Plan.

Communicate! Communicate!!

Your neighbors and members need to know what to expect when they do show up.

•If you reasonably expect more than 25 people gathering for worship, it is recommended that you do not re-open in-person worship until such time as public health policy changes and allows large groups to gather again.

As we live in covenant, we want to prevent having any of our congregations or ministries from becoming the source for a local outbreak of COVID-19. We can find ways to mitigate the spread of COVID-19 before there are effective treatments, but only with clear and consistent preventative measures.

The public health authorities and the Governor have offered a multi-phase process for re-opening our communities. Until the final phase of reopening, gatherings of more than 25 people are prohibited.) There have been suggestions that places of worship can meet in limited capacities (less than 25 attendees, including the pastor, organist and others) when a region enters the Yellow Phase, and then with larger attendance only if the church is able to meet the standards set out by the CDC and health departments that can prevent further spread. The Pennsylvania plans (presented in the table below) provide a framework for steps to take to mitigate the virus's spread and to gradually re-establish our in-person connections.

Worship Considerations Church Events/Activities Action Red Phase, Yellow Phase, Green Phase

In Summary: Church services should not be conducted in person. Yellow means proceed with caution and may be viewed as a planning and preparation phase, rather than a full reopening phase, even after moving into the green phase, social distancing measures will likely still need to be maintained to keep people safe and healthy. In-person worship no more than 25 total attending, Yes, with limitations on who should attend. Those considered high-risk should be encouraged to continue virtual worship. Minimum of 6 feet separating family units. Masks required for all attendees above 2 years old. Food Events, No.

Other Considerations in Yellow Phase-In any case, to reduce the incidence of severe, possibly life-threatening disease, individuals over the age of 65 and/or who have health conditions that make them more vulnerable, or who live with others with such conditions should continue to avoid in-person gatherings as much as possible. Please know that the individuals over 65 that we mention also includes our pastors. We want our pastors to be as safe as our congregational participants. If the church pastor, organist, liturgists, etc. are over 65 we need to maintain social-distancing and stay-at-home standards.-

Yellow Phase-gatherings can begin church worship leaders (ushers, readers, etc.):

Are younger than 65, Have no auto-immune or underlying health issues,

Will wear mask, gloves, and practice social distancing-

Offerings can be left in basket/plate by to sanctuary door. Counters should consider wearing gloves and should wash hands after counting. People should be encouraged to give electronically, by credit card, use their bank's payment program of sending checks out, give on-line via pay pal or credit card, or via texting. Congregations are strongly encouraged to invest in any technology that will be "giving friendly" to members and friends.

-Communion elements can be brought from home for each individual/family to use in the pew or served by one person (masked and gloved) up front with individual cups and bread/host/wafers placed in people's hands. Passing of trays should be avoided until further notice.

-Post signs that the congregation is following CDC guidelines for everyone's health and safety including:

Yellow--Very Limited onsite activity. Rules regarding masks, social distancing and limitations on attendees must be followed.

Green --Yes, following CDC recommendations Church Rentals-Not Allowed, following CDC recommendations. Yes as long as CDC guidelines for gathering and sanitation are met. Wearing a mask is required. Discourage those who have a fever, those who have been to high-risk areas and those who may have been exposed to COVID to not attend. This may include health care professionals as well as visitors. –

-Develop a congregational plan to follow CDC guidelines if a parishioner, a visitor, or someone who uses the building tests positive for COVID. There is so much "data" and "guidance" being offered that it is hard to know what to believe or who to trust.

We hope that this information has been helpful for you in your plans for reopening our in-person worship gatherings; however, please keep in mind that, whether we gather together in person, on the computer or just in our hearts, God is with all of us in this walk through a very scary valley.

We have decided to suspend communion until further notice. We were scheduled to have our quarterly communion in June.

Stewardship Update



While shopping, try to put yourself in the place of a 15-25 year old mom who loves nice things, but doesn't have money for anything she needs for her baby. If you love it, she will, too. If you used it with your kids, she will use it, too.

We also like to put together a "new mom" gift bag with newborn items and a few "pamper mom" items. So anything towards this end is great – even a good family oriented book (We do give them a "Mother's Comfort" Devotional guide)

Greetings from Summer Lunch Box,

As we think about the coronavirus, COVID-19 and the ripple effects on our lives, it is time to think ahead...when hand sanitizer and toilet paper will be readily available once again, for example! It's also time to begin thinking about the coming summer and the ongoing Summer Lunch Box Program.

2019 was a very busy season for the group: We served 73 families with a composite total of 199 children. We have been approved for 501c3 status. If you need it, I have included our number above.

2020 promises to be a busy season with some expansions on the horizon. By location, here are some tentative plans:

Mountain View School District -

- For the 10th consecutive year, distribution will resume at Grace Lutheran Church basement, Hop Bottom.

August 29th - Chix BBQ, Basket Raffle, Bake Sale-Gun Raffle - Hosted by - Elk Mountain VFW,

Kinsley. Tickets will be available as soon as the date is set.

Montrose School District -

- Choconut Area Children Distribution at Neumann Center, Choconut
- Montrose Children Distribution at VFW, Montrose
- Sept 19th Chix BBQ, Golf Tournament, Basket Raffle, Bake Sale-Gun Raffle Hosted by the VFW, Montrose.
- Area charitable organizations have pledged support and assistance.

Elk Lake School District -

- Distribution will be at the Elk Lake High School Cafeteria
- Local groups have promised support and help.

SLB continues to be a small, community-minded group that has taken action to provide nutritious foodstuffs for children who are food insecure. These are those children who would normally receive free/reduced priced meals during the school year. During summer recess, these same kids face food insecurities. Attempting to alleviate this food shortage, the Summer Lunch Box Program was organized in 2011. Centered in Hop Bottom, our efforts have assisted children from primarily the Mountain View School District. That will soon change, as outlined above. Registration begins soon for eligible families.

While the end of this academic year remains in limbo, SLB anticipates 5 or 6 upcoming food distribution dates. Despite our efforts to shop prudently, grocery costs continue to spiral, and each order seems more expensive than the previous one. Present funding will get us started; we are attempting to raise additional monies to cover any shortfall.

On behalf of the Summer Lunchbox Program, I am asking for your help in meeting our needs. Perhaps you yourself experienced hunger as a child or have been in contact with area hungry children. Many of us know families who often must choose between paying bills or buying groceries for their families. In these instances, food purchases often drop to the bottom of the priority list. We are 100% community and fund-raiser supported and 100% volunteer based.

Note that the Elk Mountain V.F.W. Post at Lenox once again is assisting our efforts by helping us sponsor a chicken barbecue. Tickets will be available at the V.F.W. or from any SLB committee member.
