Valentine's Day is not a big deal, or is it?

The Bible does not tell people to celebrate Saint Valentine's Day, or any other saint's day. Does this mean we should do it, or should there be no flowers, cards or expressions of love on February 14th?

Whether or not you celebrate Valentine's day depends on who you ask. I present two sides here—reasons for and against the celebration. I hope to show you the more important question is not *if* we should celebrate Valentine's Day, but *how* we celebrate Valentine's day.

Here is one argument for why Christians should not celebrate the day of red Cupids, golden arrows and modern-day overpriced merchandize.

We begin with sainthood itself. According to biblical terminology, a saint, like Valentine, is a faithful Christian. This gifted one has been called out of this world's society and given God's Spirit. Paul explains this well. "To the church of God which is at Corinth, to those who are sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be saints, with all who in every place call on the name of Jesus Christ our Lord" (1 Corinthians 1:2).

Saints are not only a few famous holy people; the whole of God's abiding church consists of people the Bible calls saints. Here's the deal though. Saints have never wanted anyone to pray to them or worship them, then or today (Acts 14:11-18; Revelation 19:10).

Would God want His people to celebrate/worship saints? Here's what He tells His people: "Do not inquire after their gods, saying, 'How did these nations serve their gods? I also will do likewise.' You shall not worship the LORD your God in that way; for every abomination to the LORD which He hates they have done to their gods" (Deuteronomy 12:30-31). In other words, don't worship other gods.

So, if you're not worshipping Saint Valentine or celebrating him, but celebrating love itself....enjoy giving—or receiving—that box of chocolate, valentine care or bunch of flowers.

See, God *is love* (1 John 4:8). Love is God. When we love, we extend God's presence into the world. Here is the truth. Secularism has taken a great deal from present-day Christian life and traditions. No one can argue that the church is no longer an American cultural hub—at least not like it was. What if that changed, even for a day—or I say the whole month of February? What if Christianity engaged some of today's secularism not for the sake of secularism, but rather for with the plan of letting God's love be known through acts of love? What if we Christians took Valentine's Day as a day to let God's love be known, felt, heard and even tasted?

I won't deny the commercialism of Valentine's Day. I won't let this mid-February holiday pass by either, not without appropriating it because it is never wrong to say, "I love you." It is never wrong to be romantic, either.

Take this further. It's never the wrong day to share a story of how God loves you, or how God loves the person you are talking with in the moment. Maybe some of us need to rethink how big Valentine's Day can be.

If we think Valentine's Day is the appreciation of a true saint who loved love and think nothing more of it than a Hallmark card holiday, then love doesn't win. I think love should win. I think love should conquer, not cower. Join me. We celebrate love the entire month in the sermon series TIME TO LOVE.

Beyond your sweetheart or your young kids, someone you know needs love. They totally need love. Whether this love comes in a red, heart-shaped box or not, do the God thing. Let love be known. Let love be shared.



Message to the Church!

During the week leading up to Christmas, I was doing my usual late Christmas shopping in one of my favorite stores, Parable Christian Book Store in Johnson City, when an item caught my eye. It looked and it was a great value, so I put it in my basket with my other items.

This is the first gift in January to all of you – you are the church, right? Well, lets see what it is – you're all in, right?

The gift is the book "Autopsy of a Deceased Church. 12 ways to keep yours Alive" by Thom Ranier. When I saw this book, I didn't think that we were in trouble, but I saw the red letters "12 ways to keep your church alive" and I thought, well, for a 200+ year old church, this church is very alive – we're active, we have all kinds of groups, we're getting more and more involved in our community, we're paying the bills, the lights and heat are on, we have a full-time pastor – right? Right, we have something here to be proud of, boast about -no, but thank God and the Holy Spirit for the work He has shown us we can do with Him- but, look around you- Is it safe to say that our congregation is aging? Yes, gracefully, but really think about it – where will we be in 10 years, 20 years, 30 years form now? I don't want us to be one of the statistics- there are over 150,000 churches in America showing some kind of sickness. Some a little and some that are terminal and some that are closer to home than we would like to admit. This church is a survivor- look at what we physically went through this past year alone – but it's not only the building – it's the level of commitment of all of you – it's the passion of the people of this congregation, led by the Holy Spirit, that continues to do amazing things. However, we need to ask ourselves some hard questions. This year our stewardship committee will be challenged like never before- and they will, in turn, be challenging you! To reminisce, to dream, and to plan, along with the Holy Spirit, what will be the future of this church.

We're healthy now – Let's not wait until we're sick! We have to ask ourselves questions like: How do we reach out to younger generations? What is church to a millennial? How can we be there for them and get them involved? How can we help our community? Am I comfortable with the way things are in this cozy little church? Do I just want the little white church on the hill to stay like I've always remembered?

I know, I have only been here eight years or so, but I remember a Methodist Church, in the town I grew up in, that was once thriving – full-time pastor, choir, junior choir, youth group, adult groups, functions, you name it, it was going on. Now, it's a three-charge church, sharing a pastor with two other churches, struggling to keep attendance at worship- it's sad!! I don't want this for our church!

So, we, the stewardship committee, are asking you: Are you in? Are you in for the long haul? Are you ready for some serious input and discussion? We're excited about what we will be planning in the future and trusting that you love the "church", and I'm not speaking of just this building or our denomination, but the Biblical Church, the Whole Church! Our gift is our church, alive and healthy. Are you "all in" to plan the future so it will stay that way?

We look forward to hearing from you and pray the Holy Spirit leads us boldly into the future.





December 11, 2018

Pastor Will opened with prayer.

Julie gave the financial report and noted that as of Nov.30, pledges for 2019 stood at \$75,904. The annual premium for property taxes in 2019 will be \$5855 which is close to a \$500 increase over 2018. In January, \$20,500 for a community building will be transferred from the general fund to the capital fund. At the end of the year, \$4139 will be sent for OCWM which is an annual donation from pledges.

The 2019 budget has been accepted by Council and is ready to be presented at the annual meeting in January.

Will shared that in the past 5 years, much of the money raised by First Congregational UCC has stayed in the community. A recent example is the "soup with a purpose" fundraiser for Heather Warren a Harford Township resident who is battling brain cancer.

Harford Community Facebook page has been established for any community event, prayer request, or suggestion which may need to be brought to the attention of the church. Will announced and introduced this face book page at the well-attended tree lighting on Nov. 25. We need to be proactive not just reactive to the needs of our community and the Facebook page can assist us in our outreach.

The annual meeting will be January 27, 2019 following church and lunch. Stewardship discussed dividing into small groups to suggest future goals for the church and to discuss the direction in which the church should move. Scout Sunday is scheduled for February 3, 2019.

A tentative date for church to meet in the Lecture Hall is Feb. 10 and a potluck dinner is planned for Feb. 24.

We all expressed our appreciation to Jo-Ann for her leadership, time, and commitment as Chairperson of the Stewardship Committee for the past 6 years.

The next Stewardship meeting is scheduled for January 17, 2019.

Message from Penn Northeast Conference 12-4-18

Greetings Friends!

Now that we have completed the work of our Fall Conference Meeting, it is time to move forward. At our Fall Conference Meeting we had two directions in which we were focusing our energy: both inward and outward. Our goal was to strengthen our work in the Penn Northeast as well as developed a stronger partnership with Pennsylvania Southeast Conference.

First, we were looking inward at the work of the Penn Northeast Conference and the direction God was leading us as a covenantal organization of churches. We discerned a new vision, mission, and purpose statement. We did some identity work to reflect on who we are and who God is calling us to become. We began moving into a new governance and ministry structure. Our governance structure helps provide good boundaries for our work and frees our ministry teams to be creative and responsive in their work and relationships. We have revised our Constitution and Bylaws to enable and empower us to do this work. Our teams have been developing goals and strategies for their ministry work. We have been working very hard, sometimes putting in double time. We have many volunteers who put in extra time and effort. All of you, the people of the Penn Northeast Conference, have been putting in your love, time, and energy, and all of this is to support and strengthen our local churches. What a gift!

Second, we were looking outward to partnership with the Pennsylvania Southeast Conference. We charged the Joint Conference Visioning and Development Team to present a vision and plan for developing a new Eastern Pennsylvania Conference. Our Conference voted to continue this work. The PSEC did not affirm the plan to continue the unification conversation. At this point, we still have a ministry relationship with PSEC. We will continue to work together and invite one another to our many programs and ministry teams. We have decided not to move forward with a unified conference council at this time. That does not mean our relationships have ended. We will continue to partner in clergy convocation, the ecumenical relations team, disaster response, ministry days, boundary trainings, and more!

What does this mean for us?

It means that we will continue our work as the Penn Northeast Conference. We will build on the foundation we have set, and we will continue to strengthen our churches and partnerships in our area. We will continue to do ministry with Pennsylvania Southeast. The PSEC Consistory and the PNEC Board will decide how we will move forward with the governance conversations. Right now, this process has hit a pause, and we need to take some time to figure out where we go next.

Bonnie will continue to serve as our Designated Conference Minister. Bonnie has been called for a three year term, and she will continue to see us through this time of transition. She is doing an amazing job leading us through this time of discernment, and we are grateful for her leadership through these changes.

Right now, we are in the midst of change, and we will work together as we find our way forward. 
Are you interested in having a plaque attached to the memorial stone in the memorial garden? One may have a plaque ordered by doing the following: Cost---\$25.00
