Now that's a good one to answer! On the surface, this is not a challenging question. Many joys in your life may immediately come to mind. Perhaps it was a significant graduation, or your wedding day. Maybe it was a big birthday.

Think more on this question about what brings you joy. I imagine you've placed Christ's Resurrection on your list.

Yes. The resurrection! Now that IS joy!

Psalm 30 extols David's joy in the LORD because the LORD has helped him escape a dangerous situation—his own death! David's first response? Yes, it is to sing a psalm of joy to the LORD.

Think about how Jesus' disciples felt when they learn their teacher/leader/friend has risen from the grave on Easter morning just like He said he would. After a horrifying week which started with rejoicing and ended in an awful death, the first thing the followers of Jesus do on what we call the first Easter morning is express what? That's right! Joy! They have joy that the Master is alive and well.

In Matthew's Gospel chapter 28, verse 8, we discover that Mary Magdalene and Mary, Jesus' mother, feel great joy when they discover the empty tomb and that Christ had risen. Easter joy is in their hearts. Jesus is alive! This proves the truth of everything that Jesus told them while He was with them.

The first Easter story continues. On that first Easter evening, Jesus shows the nail holes in his hands and feet to His disciples and their joy overwhelms them.

This joy is experienced by the disciples and followers of Jesus on the first Easter. The men and women who knew Jesus and those who traveled with him experienced the great delivery of the LORD's promises on the Resurrection morning.

The prophets had told the people for centuries that a day would come when the Messiah of the world would sacrifice Himself for them. That promise was not fully understood or fully known then. They discovered on that first Easter morning what everything Jesus told them meant. The years of Jesus' teaching and the events of Passion week started to make some sense. They rejoiced and were glad on that first Easter. Jesus had transformed their heaviness of sackcloth and mourning into an incredible, almost indescribable joy.

Let this joy be your joy this Easter. Resound with the greatest news.

# The LORD lives!

# LET THERE BE LIGHT THIS EASTER

What do you do when you walk into a dark room? You reach for the light switch, right? For many of us, it's probably hard to imagine living without that little thing called "the lightbulb."

Can you imagine experiencing that invention for the first time? What a life-changing experience! In 1893, Chicago hosted the World's Fair. And one of the most memorable events of that World's Fair, was on May first when nearly 100,000 incandescent lights instantly flooded the nighttime sky. For many, this was their first experience with this novelty called the lightbulb. That little thing – the lightbulb – has changed the world in which we live.

One little baby, born 2000 years ago in overcrowded Bethlehem, changed the world in which we live. Some may wonder how one child, born so many years ago, can still make such an impact us today. To answer, let's go to the beginning.

In the beginning, God said, "Let there be light." and time began. The infinite darkness was instantly shattered by light. God spoke and the universe and everything in it came into existence including the first two people who God had carefully, personally crafted with His own hands. These two people were to be the crown of his creation. They were meant to live forever in the perfect world that he had created for them. They were to reflect the glory of their Creator as they daily lived to honor and serve him.

But that perfect world and that perfect relationship with God was soon shattered by the darkness of sin. Adam and Eve selfishly thought that they knew better than God. They disobeyed God, and just as suddenly as light had shattered darkness, now the darkness of sin shattered God's perfect creation. A relationship without fear, a world without pain, a life without death – was instantly gone!

Fast forward. It is no wonder that the angels could not contain themselves on the night of Jesus' birth. They shouted, "Glory to God in the highest heaven!" (Luke 2:14) because there, in that manger, in that one newborn, God's glory was being revealed. This baby is none other than the one who created light at the beginning of time. This baby is none other than God Himself.

Some 30 years after Jesus was born, Jesus made it clear what his purpose was for coming into this world when he said, "The Son of man came to seek and to save what was lost" (Luke 19:10). From the moment of his conception till the day of his death, Jesus was searching and saving those lost in the darkness. Each day, Jesus went to battle the darkness for us. Jesus perfectly lived, to the glory of his heavenly Father, for us who have so failed to do so in our words, thoughts and actions. Jesus' love for the lost drove him to the cross, where he took the punishment of hell, eternal separation from God, for the sins of all the world. And then, on Easter morning, Jesus rose from the dead to declare that a drastic change had occurred.

For those who trust in him, Jesus gives His perfect life for the payment of sins which He made at the cross. Jesus taking the punishment meant for us, is God's way of plucking people out of the darkness of this world to live with Him in the glory of heaven.

This Easter, roll away the stone that is keeping you from the light.

Your Redeemer lives!

Your Redeemer also lights your way through darkness.





### When we journey with Christ, we discover we change, engage and live out not only who Christ is, but who we are.

For the Lenten series this year called *A Journey Through Lent*, I brought us through the lectionary and wondered with you what it looks like when we take scripture beyond the stories in the text that we engage each week. For example, on the first Sunday in Lent, we picked up the passage where Jesus is tempted for 40 days and 40 nights by Satan (Matthew 4:1-11). While we hear the conversation between the two in our reading, reason has it that the two had more than one conversation in their time together. What did they talk about? We hear how Jesus refutes Satan's temptations, but did they agree on anything? Were more temptations offered, or did the verses we read include them all?

We can't know the answers to these questions on this side of life, of course, but we can begin to understand what we need to understand, which is this: even Jesus had to deal with Satan not once but daily. We have to deal with (and shut down!) Satan in the same way. With this realization on our journey not just through Lent but through life, we can feel even more empowered to level the enemy just as Jesus did—and that's through the use of scripture.

On the second Sunday of Lent, we met a pharisee who did know scripture, and that was Nicodemus (John 3:1-17). What he didn't know, drew him by night to Jesus. Nicodemus doesn't realize Jesus is Lord in this encounter (from what we read), but something changes within himself on his journey since he met Christ. We don't hear of Nicodemus again until chapter 7, but here, in front of the Sanhedrin, he speaks up for Jesus and is shut down. Finally, we read of Nicodemus with Joseph of Arimathea (John 19). The two take Jesus' body down from the cross and prepare it with expensive oils Nicodemus bought. What changed on Nicodemus's journey from that first nighttime meeting to lovingly taking Jesus' body off the cross speaks volumes about how, over time, Jesus reaches us, also. Nicodemus's journey is our journey, too.

On the third Sunday of Lent, we hear from one almost completely opposite Nicodemus, the woman at the well (John 4:5-42). Nameless in the text, she doesn't have a theological education, and meets Jesus midday. Unlike Nicodemus, she realizes in her one and only meeting with Jesus that he is indeed the Lord. Whereas Nicodemus never proclaims Jesus as Christ in the Bible, she does. She brings the whole town to an understanding of who Jesus is. Her journey, like ours, becomes one about sharing (and living) the gospel message once we know who Jesus is.

On the fourth Sunday in Lent, another nameless character is introduced, the man born blind (John 9:1-41). His journey is like ours in that he doesn't ask Jesus for healing. Sometimes we don't either. We take life as it is—sometimes good, sometimes challenging. But Jesus changes him, just as Jesus changes us, so that we, like the man born blind, can see. Specifically, we can see how (and what) Jesus wants us to see.

On the fifth Sunday in Lent, we have the story of the raising of Lazarus. If we are to journey best through Lent and beyond, then we looked at Jesus' love not in theory, but in action. Jesus loved Lazarus just as he loved his sisters Martha and Mary. This report comes before this sermon, but from the pulpit I'll talk about how love can be messy, or at least not contained in a next box. When we love, for example, we do exactly what Jesus did. We get angry. We also weep.

If Easter is to have any bearing, we need to be conscious of our journey through Lent. In understanding more of who Christ is with those he meets, we see that Jesus meets us, too. Just as he changed Nicodemus in time, he changes us, too.

No prior experience is necessary and the ability to read music helps but is also not necessary.



### Finance Committee - 3-22-23

Attending: Maureen Warren, Julia Gardner, Holli Chichester, Nancy Burris, Connie Breese Discussion of the church's current financial situation:

- 1. Current giving is not equal to the current spending. (Giving in January and February are usually somewhat lower than needed).
- 2. Stock donation from a congregation member will be held as stock for a bit. The value will be determined and watched for increases or decreases.
- 3. Annuity #1 hits the year mark on April 11, 2023. We have 15 days from that point to decide if we wish to change how the money is allocated within the annuity. We received no interest this year due to the gyrations of the market. Nancy recommends changing to a fixed interest return. That program is currently at an annual 5.15%. We recommend checking the percent return on April 11. If it is around the current rate, move the money within the annuity to that program.
- 4. Annuity #2 hits the year mark on July 27 and Annuity #3 hits the year mark on August 24. We recommend following the same procedures with these two annuities.
- 5. We reviewed the financial situation that occurred in 2021 where giving did not cover expenses and approximately \$10,000 had to be taken from other programs and funds. We recommend taking \$23,404.45 from the money remaining from 2022 and place it in the highest yielding savings account for emergences (this is approximately two years of emergency coverage).
- 6. We additionally recommend taking the remaining \$50,000 and place it in a fixed rate annuity. The money would be protected from losses in the market and grow modestly.
- 7. This would give us four annuities. Two of these annuities have the ability to release 10% of the total to us in the event of a catastrophe. Annuity #2's principle can not be used, only the interest.

### Pastor's Report to Council

One of the joys I regularly share during our time of joy in worship is so important! I say, "You're here!"

In these days where Covid rearranged how we gather (or even IF we gather anywhere!), I find it such a joy to name what we in worship together experience—and that's the JOY of being together. I continue to be humbled, impressed, and grateful for those who come out each Sunday and participate in worship firsthand. I know not everyone can be present in worship for understandable reasons, so those who faithfully participate online—cheers to you, too.

The connections we make when together are vital to the life and the joy we experience as a congregation. As Lent 2023 brings us into the season of Easter, I invite those who have somehow been bumped away from worship to realize the time to join the fellowship again is now.

I find it so important to share again that worship is about celebrating the living, breathing, passionate Christ that is inside all of us by way of the ever-present Holy Spirit. We talk differently and respond differently to each other when in church. Love is here. Care is here. Joy is here. And this? This is AMAZING!

I write elsewhere here in *Our Spire* about the Lenten sermon series this year, but didn't mention how affirming and powerful it is to hear us as a congregation sing through Lent. I hear some say that they cannot sing. I'll disagree. To be surrounded by voices singing what turns into powerful response, testimony and prayers is truly wonderful. For example, during the confession on the March 19<sup>th</sup> service, I invited us to sing a verse of *Amazing Grace* a cappella. I wasn't giving Robert Fisher's fingers at the keyboard a break as much as I was making us aware of how well, how deep, and how true those lyrics and that melody line is. These hymns carry us. They define us. They become who we are and how we are.

And to hear that singing from the voices all around makes you realize what I have said, that this is a Spirit moved and moving place of God.

One Sunday in my Sunday school class I had only young women with me (usually it's mostly guys or all guys). This was such a gift from God because of the lectionary scripture that day, the woman at the well. In prep for that sermon, I read a great deal of feminist and womanist theology from outstanding sources. To share with these young women what I had learned opened conversation about sexuality today. My students are teens. Yes, we talk about relationships—peer pressures, internalized pressures, and the peace that comes when we know we have Christ to turn to and find out not only who He is, but who we are when with Him.

My class meets in my office. It is sacred space because it is nearly private space. Much can be shared because we do not meet in a space where we can easily be overheard.

What an honor it was to be invited to be a part of the Boy Scouts Court of Honor on March 4<sup>th</sup>. I gave the invocation and a prayer to the two Eagle Scouts we celebrated, Gavin Bewley and Alex Empet. I have known both boys (now young men!) since they were in elementary school. It was an amazingly uplifting service. I remain grateful to you, the congregation, for being so present to both the Boy and the Girl Scouts through the years. Pray with me that our connection and our support to them remains bright and strong in the future.

It is a joy to be singing with the choir again during the *Feast of the Pascal Lamb* on Palm Sunday this year. Working with Robert and the choir is always a treasure.

I presided at the funeral of Terry Werkheiser on Saturday night, March 18. The text I felt called to share was the same text that was to be shared the following day, the man born blind (John 9:1-41). This was a powerful move because through the Holy Spirit I shared with mostly unchurched people this truth: we are all blind at times and many of us, like the man born blind, never ask Jesus for sight. This doesn't stop Jesus from approaching us over and over and offering us ways to see not only *who* He is but also *how* He is—a Savior who keeps saving us and those around us when we speak of Him. I didn't know anyone at this service, though I met Terry's son in person once. Lives changed that night thanks to what Terry did, which was to get to a sanctuary of God such as the one here in Harford.

### Pastor's Report to Council Continued

I'm never going to give great detail in the pastoral visits I have, but will say such great conversations usually happen in them. The joy of being your pastor for this many years means many of us have such a longstanding relationship. Newcomers are always a joy, too. Together we hear from God. This brings light and joy even (or especially) when some situations are not so joyful.

Our Route 11 Ministerium Lenten Services end next Wednesday night, March 29<sup>th</sup>. I'll miss this year's fellowship among the people who have come out as well as casual and worship time with the fellow pastors. I will share it has been wonderful to sit with my kids in the pews with the exception of the night I preached, March 22<sup>nd</sup>, in Great Bend. Our turnouts this year have been spirited and substantial. What a gift it is to stand behind a different pulpit with a different congregation and feel the love of Christ around us.

Our new membership class will have started by the time you read this. I am looking forward to this class and am grateful that members of our church will be joining me and the class as we learn about the history of the United Church of Christ and also about our church. Prayers are welcome for this class and the sharing we'll enjoy together.

I am thankful David Schulte will host the Good Friday Service this year. I am ready early with the bulletins and the preparations for the Easter Sunrise and Easter 10 AM services. I will do both as I have in the past. I do ask for prayers for my family and me as Holy Saturday is the day of my mom's memorial service. I will officiate this service as well as give the eulogy.

But after a few days without these items, they definitely miss them. Your hygiene kits offer a refreshing daily boost for someone when supplies are hard to come by. Please remember to send \$2/kit to CWS to cover the costs of processing.

### SUPPLIES NEEDED:

- One 1-gallon Ziploc bag
- One hand towel measuring 15\*x28\* to 16"x32\* (No fingertip, bath, dish, or micro-fiber towels.)
- One washcloth

One wide-tooth comb removed from the package (Found at discount dealers like sallybeauty.com. Search for wide tooth pastel comb to see example)

- Must be sturdy with at least 6° of teeth
- No pocket combs or picks
- Rattail and combs without handles are acceptable
- One fingernail or toenail clipper (Either one is acceptable. Remove from packaging.)
- One bath-size bar of soap in the original package
- One toothbrush in the original package
- Ten standard size Band-Aids

All items must fit inside the Ziploc bag. Remove the excess air from the bag and seal before boxing. Do not add any extra items or toothpaste. A tube of extended expiration date toothpaste will be added to each hygiene kit just prior to its journey.
