Each congregation does what it can do. As congregations, we all hold pieces in Christ's potential ministry actualized here on earth. And this? This is exciting!

We should not compare one congregation to another, one church to another. As communities, we each have our place, our opportunities, our challenges, our strengths as well as those ministry places that just aren't there yet.

I share this because I see this congregation's presence—this congregation's ministry—reaching further into the community. Honestly, this is a HUGE thing to say because there is always more to do. There are always houses to reach, always more people to greet, and always more neighbors to connect with and unite. But we're here. Collectively, we are saying in bold prayer, "Lord, use us. Lord, speak through us. Lord, be in us, and in turn, in our reach toward others."

With the kiddos, I have not done outbound ministry since Covid-19 hit almost a year ago. On Valentine's Day however, and you can read the report on this here in this edition, we trekked out by van onto the snow-packed highways and byways around 5016 Creek Road, which is the physical address of the church. Sadly, but honestly, we missed far, far more people than we are able to meet, but something is better than nothing. A little hope and love in one place spreads to hope and love elsewhere.

See with me, that this church, through the virus, is not still. It is not quiet. Instead, we, as a congregation, have spread beyond walls. We have had to. And we've done it, not alone, but by and through the Holy Spirit. It is as if there is something in the air like that lingering, heavenly scent of multiflora rose at that point in the summer where even winter lovers like me find rest and hope and love in the balmy days of the year. We are guided. We are growing.

This growth takes place during tremendous, immeasurable losses accrued through the virus, and land us in scarring, painful places. This is a reality. But there is a gain. We are out there far more. This "being out there," of course, is not by choice. With no one attending worship the way we did, we see that church and community are no longer distinct. They are no longer separate. If you would like to know more of what I mean here, or if you'd like to experience more of what I mean here, I invite you to participate (not 'watch' but participate) in worship virtually. So many of you near and far are doing this (and this is awesome!), so I am going to ramp this up a bit. So, more specifically, I invite you to participate in worship in as public a space as you can find, even if that means you are able to look out a window to the world as you experience God in the music and message of the service. You'll notice something as you peer into the world. No, it's not the white wood trim with the historic blue walls and handsome red carpet; *it's worship beyond a building.* It is connecting to God in God's world beyond a closed-door community. I know the phrase "closed door community" stings for you as much as it does for me, but this is literally true. We don't worship with doors literally open, especially in the wintertime. (I can see at least four Trustees with stone faces if any of you even *think* of opening those doors through the late snowy, frosty season!)

Here is where I feel God is leading us. To worship in a world, that may seem secular to some, is our witness, our opportunity to make what some would call unholy ground into the holy ground? Well, that is community church. We cannot undo this virus. We can certainly claim to be victimized by it, or, knowing God has a plan for us even in times of trial and tribulation, we can follow Him. We can hold and share in our demeanor the aura—the essence—of worship as we glance up from our handheld devices as we wait for our vehicle's oil to be changed, for example. No, God is not done with His command to go and make disciples of this world (Matthew 28:19). He is opening us—challenging us—equipping us—to bring His message and its meaning to the world. And that, dear community church, is well beyond exciting.

Happy Anniversary COVID-19

I was ready to checkout. I set my items on the drug store counter. The cashier wasn't behind the registrar, so I turned to see where the associate might be. It was then that I spotted a small display of Valentine's Day items at my bargain-loving price of 50% off. Nothing for me or my munchkins. The associate, having come up an aisle and was now standing at the register, directed me to more Valentine sweets at a reduced price. It was then that I spotted what I have not seen in all my February Valentine shopping madness. (For those of you who do not know, I LOVE Valentine's Day). Facemasks! Valentine's Day Facemasks! What can I buy and hold onto these for next year? And then the thought hit me. Another year of masks. Almost Anniversary, dear COVID-19. A whole year of this. Unimaginable.

As I sit here and think of what was, what is, and what is still unknown to us in the months ahead, I am reminded of the year 586 BC. That was the year the city that would never fall—Jerusalem—fell into the enemy hands of the Babylonians. The elites and the socialites were carted off as spoils of the war, loot as it were. The people of God became slaves. Specifically, they became slaves in a foreign land with foreign gods. This wasn't a two-week or two-year ordeal. This enslavement became generational. Where...Was...God.

It's unfathomable to imagine this historic event in all its magnitude. This point in our Judeo-Christian history does, however, help us understand that God's plan and God's timing are not ours. Equally, this helps us understand our suffering Servant, Jesus. As Christians, we are not placed here on earth for pleasant or even pretty experiences. This thing called life, specifically, this thing called the Christian life, can be painful!

This pain defines us. Of course, this pain—this deep discomfort—is not welcome, but it is received. Here we are learning to be patient in suffering, persistent in hope, and ready to share with all the promise God makes through each and every generation that reads and holds to His word: our God is with us. He will deliver us. He will set us free.

Another memory comes to mind that may help you understand who and how God is through this time of the pandemic. I was a Jersey shore lifeguard back in the day. I spent two wonderful summers on the beach. Yes, it was a dream come true!

Manasquan, New Jersey, the beach town I called home over those two summers, has a mile-long beach. The mile is divided into thirds—north, main and south. Each divide had a captain. I was assigned to the north. We were known as the north end anchors. I loosely use the word "we" here because then, like now, I am 5'10", 170 pounds. And it is true. I am no anchor. The linebacker guys I worked with, however, were. Big dudes. In rough tide, I was the one in the water with the rope around what we called a 'toy', the iconic red floatation device used to help swimmers out of danger. These burly guys, in a line on the sand, would pull me so fast out of the water that I had to make sure the drawstring around my shorts was indeed tight. They were that strong. They were that good as powerhouses to pull me and whomever I was with out of danger.

There is no exaggeration here. Our captain, Doug Bowers, said something that reflects upon the situation the exiled people in Babylon experienced. During rough water when you are under water and the churning tide is most like a monstrous washing machine on beyond too powerful spin cycle, he said what is true. You will always float. You will always come to the top—eventually.

Just like those enslaved so far from home, we will get through this. Our anchor is God. Jesus is that red floatation device. *Hold onto Him*. Like me, you may have to cinch your drawstring a little tighter on the ride, but we are going to get out of this.

Then, when on safe sand again, we can repurpose those Valentine facemasks. Help me out here as to what to do with them. The beach on windy days is great for kite flying. Maybe use the masks as bows on the tail just below the kites themselves?

A prayer for those lost to Covid

If we held a minute's silence consecutively for every one of the 500,000 people who have died from Covid in the US, it would take 347 days, almost a full year, to honor them all (Source: Yahoo News).

PRAYER: Lord, this amount of loss is numbing, tragic, overwhelming, daunting, disastrous. Many of us complain or at least feel burdened by mask wearing and other restrictions. We are weary, worried, tired, heavy, and as the one year mark approaches, we are just plain "done." Add to this the amount of memorializing we must do as a nation can seem to be too much.

All of this is too much. And then, to add to this, there is always the question when our safety has been breached: who will be next?

When the number of Covid deaths topped the number of deaths from World War I, World War II, and the Vietnam War combined, we have to realize, heavenly Father, that You, our God, hear us. You are with us.


Our grief is Your grief, too. Our cries are heard. Our loss is felt. Our tears affect You. You weep, too.

"Let's Train with Jesus"

Scripture: Matthew 4:1-11

"Then Jesus was led by the Spirit into the desert to be tested by the devil." In my life, the phrase "led by the Spirit to be tested" is the same as "My alarm clock went off and a new day started."

How can we be like Jesus in times of testing? Jesus trained constantly for times of testing, like we might train at the gym. But Jesus wasn't on a treadmill. Jesus trained through fasting, prayer, and remembering scripture, and that made all the difference. Lent is an invitation for us to join Jesus in these spiritual disciplines so that we may be ready for our times of testing.

Fasting is not very popular today, other than when one is dieting, but fasting is not a diet. Fasting is the practice of giving up food, or a certain kind of food, for a limited space of time. For example, someone may give up desserts for Lent, or not drink soda one day a week. Fasting isn't limited to food; one may also give up TV time, or social media, or complaining. The idea is to give up something that will create a space in our life - a space we usually fill up with food or entertainment - and then give that space to God. I have been fasting once a week for several years now, and even though I still inwardly groan whenever fasting day is here, I recognize the important things fasting does inside me. It pulls me out of my self- focus. It is hard to watch everyone else eating whatever they want while I can't - it humbles me, and makes me aware of all the billions of people around the world who don't get enough to eat any day. Fasting puts me in my rightful place - a place of humility and gratitude.

But giving something up is only half the picture. Giving something up for a fast leaves a space - what will we do with it? Well, we can guess that Jesus probably wasn't out in the desert for 40 days just kicking sand and wishing it was over! We know that when Jesus had time, he prayed.

The word "prayer" in the New Testament translates literally to "interact with the Lord by switching human wishes for the Lord's wishes as he imparts faith." Think about that for a minute. Switch our human wishes for the Lord's wishes. And isn't that exactly what Jesus does when he is tempted? "Turn stones to bread." Jesus says "I want the word of God more." "Throw yourself off this temple and let's see how your divine insurance policy works." Jesus says "God wants me to trust Him without having to see miracles on command." "You can have it all if you worship me." Jesus says "Worship is for God alone, nothing else has lasting value." A life rooted in prayer helps us to see God's focus in any given situation, and that is why prayer is vital.

One more tip from the Savior in times of testing: What does Jesus say every time he is tested? "It is written." Where is it written? In the scriptures! Instead of stocking up on toilet paper, let's stock up our brains with scripture! Even having just one key verse ready to go at all times can be the difference between success and failure in our tests!

If Jesus needed to train for his testing, how much more do we need to? Let's follow His example, so we are ready for whatever tests lie ahead!

Getting to know you - Hi! I am new in town, and we probably haven't seen each other without masks if we have seen each other at all! I am the new pastor at First United Methodist Church of New Milford, and I moved here in July with my husband and his mother. The kids are grown and off in the world, so all we have are 5 cats to boss around. We are looking forward to getting to know all of you in this beautiful corner of PA when everything opens up again!

Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the Harford First Congregational Church-UCC was held in the sanctuary following church on Sunday, January 21, 2021. Moderator David Schulte called the meeting to order at 11:09AM. Pastor William Hagenbuch offered a prayer. The sign in sheet showed 20 adults present. In breaking with tradition, there was no luncheon served due to COVID rules.

Reports from the Annual Report were reviewed with a few additions.

<u>Pastor's Report addition</u> My 3-page report this year was the longest I've ever contributed to an annual meeting. Given the year we had in 2020, the report could have been twice as long. So much happened since mid-March of this past year. Death tolls rise, loss continues, and hope, which at times can seem hard to find, is grounded in the Word of God.

Here, I want to thank each committee and hardworking group represented in these pages. Your energies and your efforts inspire others. Keep fishing for people.

When the world gave us a wall with this ongoing Corona virus and great loss and lasting separation occurred, you found ways to make doors and windows to keep what you love, which are the people of this congregation, connected. I am blessed and I am humbled to work with you. Our God has taught us a great deal about how our trust in Him continues to yield results in His Kingdom.

These words will be read a year from now in next year's report at the start of 2022. We will not forget how worship was challenged, how gathering was challenged, and how God met each of those challenges with His love and His grace, His mercy and His tenderness. Yes, even when we cannot gather as we have, our God still gathers us and keeps us in His care.

<u>Treasurer's report additions---</u>Following the report, David Schulte pointed out that in 2020 we took in \$131,685.45 and spent \$124,089.04. That looks good because we finished the year on the plus side but if we had spent what was proposed in the budget, we would have spent beyond the funds taken in. The congregation was thanked for careful spending. David offered a caution that the members will need to be very careful financially in 2021.

Nominating revisions-Julie Gardner offered an observation on the slate of officers. Kay Gow had been nominated to be a trustee but because trustees suggest a salary for church employees this was a conflict of interest as Kay is the custodian. To remedy that situation, Kandy Wellman offered to switch committees with Kay so Kay will fill the last year of Kandy's stewardship (for 2021). Kandy will fulfill Kay's trustee nomination ('21-'22-'23). Because of the resignation of David Schulte III from Deacons, Lisa Hahn's term will only be '21-'22 as she will fulfill the last two years of David's term. For Stewardship, Ellen Holdredge will be filling Joe Kulyeshie's last year so Ellen's term of office will only be for 2021. Moderator, David Schulte asked if there were any further nominations from the floor. Hearing none, the nominations were closed. There was a motion by Gus Ferrara with a second by Kay Gow that the acting clerk cast the electing ballot. Passed. Acting clerk, Ellen Holdredge declared the nominees elected. Thanks to Wendy Phillips for the full slate of officers.

The meeting adjourned at 11:35AM.

Trustees will hold meetings on the second Monday of the month at 7pm in Pastors office. The weather stripping on the bottom of the door to the lecture hall needs to be replaced again. It was recently replaced but is being damaged by people propping the door open with a concrete block. Gary will see if it can be adjusted again or if something can be installed to keep the door open without damaging it. Gary placed a hook on the outside of the church to hold the alley door open. The vinyl flooring in the Vestibule continues to separate. Trustees discussed the possibilities of repairs that could be made or replacing it portions of it or all of it.

Switched propane provider from Kestone to Heller and electricity from Constellation to New Wave.

Old Business: The light in the alley near the Kitchen entrance has been replaced with a new LED light and fixture. Measure Square Footage of driveway and parking area for concrete. Gary received proposals to replace lamp posts and lamps in front of the church from Spectrum Electric. The proposal included the cost of replacing one post and fixture and upgrading the existing fixture to match. Rich Masters made a motion to replace both lamp posts and fixtures for a total cost of around \$3,500. Paula Smith, the Summer Lunchbox CEO, noticed that some of the extra Summer Lunchbox food would expire before summer 2021. 
