

#### **Membership Matters**

The February sermon series still stirs and excites me—and I hope the same for you. Over the past month, we have focused on what may feel obvious (but may not be said, or said enough). There is strength in number. There is comfort in number. There is necessity in number.



Each week during the series, I have talked about the joy of ministry we successfully do solo, alone. We achieve great work for the Kingdom independently. Amen to this!

I have also invited us to think about what work for the Kingdom we do interdependently. Such great energy and thoughts come when we consider the joy of living together for Christ! For example, in a congregationally-based UCC church, we do so much collective thinking that leads to mission work and output not from a single thought, but from a team effort. I see this clearly when our council meets monthly. After each diverse report is presented (such as Deacons, Stewardship, Trustees, Willing Workers and Missionary—just to name a few), our church council offers input, insight, opinion and careful consideration. What delights me as your pastor is how thorough and kindhearted this process is. Your council members do bring different values and perspectives to each conversation, and this is always—always—a win. Sometimes we disagree—at first. Sometimes we have challenges before us. But always—always—we rely on the Holy Spirit to help us hear each other. The result is better, stronger and greater decision making.

There's appreciation, too. Just like when worship in the sanctuary ends, your council members carry on conversations all the way to the parking lot. A joy is when two disagree for a moment or two during the meeting over a particular matter until the best (or most beneficial) decision is reached, the two have a greater appreciation for each other. I am not sure all church governing boards care for each other as our council does. How we value the group process permeates in everything we say, do, and achieve together not just at council but as a congregation.

A sermon point during the first sermon in this series comes again and again in regard to membership. Ecclesiastes 4:12 says, "A person standing alone can be attacked and defeated, but two can stand back-to-back can conquer. Three are even better, for a triple-braided cord is not easily broken."

I think of us as individuals. We are present to each other. We care for each other. When my mother was compromised for more than half of this past year for example, there was one team in place and you know its base. Everyone who took care of my mom belonged to the church. That is not just sweet. That is powerful and beautiful and important.

Commitments wane more and more each year in our society. The enemy chooses to divide us with lies such as "I can do more for the church later", "That's a group that has its flaws", "That's just a little place that doesn't

do much." These lies are unfortunate because we buy into them, at least on some level.

Let's continue to battle the devil and be an intentional part of the whole so that a whole lot more love, attention, kindness, generosity, care and joy can be known not by some, but by so many.

#### Letter from our Sabbatical Conference Minister, Rev. Dr. Becky Beckwith

For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "Plans to prosper you and not harm you. Plans to give you hope and a future." Jeremiah 29:11

The one thing I consistently hear in every committee, organization, or group, is that we need to get better at communicating. I agree. I would also be so brazen, as to hope that God would communicate with me.

Successful people, leaders make things happen. They know where they are going. They set and accomplish goals. Jeremiah was not considered successful. No one listened to him. Throughout his life he wept at the fate of his country, and he spent considerable time sharing God's message of doom.

Although we might look at Jeremiah and shake our heads, God saw Jeremiah differently. God saw a man who was answering a Call, a faithful man, a man who was indeed successful in the eyes of God.

Really? How does one know one is successful in the eyes of God? How is that communicated? When are our eyes open and our hearts connected in a way that makes us know, just know that God is smiling on us?

The churches I've served have heard me speak often of "A Ha" or "God" moments. Those are the sacred occurrences that come into my life when I am least expecting them. The times when the right door opens, the words said make complete sense or when it's clear that God is right smack in the middle of what has just happened.

We humans need to be communicating with each other. If life is to go well for a couple, then they need to be sharing their thoughts and feelings. If big things are going to be changing at work or church – it's imperative to talk about it. If you really want to set important goals and work toward achieving them – then include prayer in the planning.

I like the Jeremiah passage and hold it close to me when I'm looking ahead. Plans to prosper, to do well. Plans to give hope into the future. This is God's ways of communicating. If I need to have something more – I remember the grandchild's smile when we came to visit, or I watch the sunset. God is communicating. It's a God moment!

#### Pastor's Report to Council

The Your Membership—Your Ministry sermon series concluded February 19<sup>th.</sup> This said, I hear God calling this series back in a slightly different way following Lent. Lord willing, I will pick a new theme that speaks to our togetherness as a congregation in the season of Easter. I feel called to do this because there is more to be said about what it means to be "church," gathering in a place of fellowship, and celebrating the Holy Spirit among us. We experience these gifts when together. It's time to talk them out in a God-lead follow-through series.

The membership series held information about commitment in addition to what it means to be a community who hears the call to care not just individually but collectively. When we gather, we can be the arms and the feet of Jesus. Offering our shoulders and our love, we are a support system in a world that can be painful, lonely, depressing, or even heartbreaking. Let's continue to shine together in Christian love for a world that needs Christian love.

**Project 2:** Hurricane and Tornado Disaster Relief: Due to the increase of natural disasters this year, the Church World Service (CWS) has significantly depleted their Disaster Relief Kits. We have voted to work to supply Hygiene Kits to the CWS. We will begin this collection at the end of March and run the collection through April 18. On April 18, 2023 we will assemble the Hygiene Kits for distribution to the CWS warehouse April 24. Ellen will begin the Hygiene Kit Collection on March 26 during a Minute for Mission time. She will bring in a completed kit so all can see the required items.

**Yard Sale:** The yard Sale is currently set for September 1-2. We discussed alternative dates such as May 27-27 or August 25-26. Every date impacts other events at the church. We will continue to look at different dates.

#### Earthquake Relief for Turkey and Syria Sponsored by Missionary Group

Samaritan's Purse stands ready to respond at a moment's notice whenever and wherever disaster strikes. They specialize in meeting critical needs for victims of conflict, disaster, famine, and epidemics throughout the world, often working through ministry partners on the ground. They provide food, water, shelter, medicine, and other assistance in the Name of Jesus Christ.

They pre-position supplies in warehouses strategically located around the world so they can quickly respond to crises. When disaster strikes, they deploy Disaster Assistance Response Teams comprised of experienced professionals trained in meeting the needs of disaster victims. Back at international headquarters, their Incident Management Team ensures that supplies are flowing and provides other support to their staff on the ground.

This Emergency Field Hospital was airlifted from Atlanta to Turkey on Feb. 9. Staff and materials were urgently transported to Antakya where their team quickly began raising the mobile facility on property surrounding the 1,100-bed Hatay State Hospital, which was irreparably crippled and made unsafe by the earthquakes.

The loss of the region's key healthcare facility further compounds the desperation felt by communities who've experienced unimaginable loss, grief, and the destruction of all they had.



The death toll from this disaster well exceeds 40,000 people, mostly in Turkey but also in Syria, and tens of thousands more are injured and displaced. These tragic numbers continue to rise.

A steady stream of patients continues to fill their triage, emergency room, and intensive care unit as ambulances and walk-ins arrive from the surrounding communities. Delays in treatment since the earthquake have allowed infections to set in, making injuries and illness more severe.

"Our Emergency Field Hospital is now open, and our medical team has already treated earthquake injuries like broken bones, wounds, and infections," said Franklin Graham, president of Samaritan's Purse. "People are suffering, and we are there to meet their physical needs in Jesus' Name. Please pray for everyone affected and for our Disaster Assistance Response Team as they meet these emergency needs."




