A WAY TO TOMORROW: What this Doctorate Degree means to You and Our Church

I see this viable church continuing. For this to happen in the long run, we need to look at what's around us and what's in front of us.

What is around us is a community that cannot hold high school graduates. Jobs are few. Many houses in and around Harford are not what they used to be, and far too many are for sale or are a challenge to sell.

That can seem like a downer to many of us. Perhaps it is. But God is not done here. Neither are we.

What is in front of us is a challenge that can be met by fishing for people who may not be near, but call the Harford Church home—or perhaps will call the Harford Church their home church, even if they do not live anywhere near Harford.

This dissertation, which is not two thirds complete, is actually a major project in that I am learning to be a scholar practitioner, one who learns and also does. I cannot just synthesize information to get this degree. I actually have to do something, and the outcome of that something is unknown at this time. That something could succeed—hopefully! It may also fail.

As we look to what's in front of us, we are going to use technology to bring us even closer together. Imagine with me what it will be like to have a church hub in our lives that is just a swipe away on our phones. Consider the possibilities of being able to find "church" throughout the week. And "church" isn't something you "just watch"; it is a live meeting ground where you continue to learn, engage, share, and even have fun. Pressed schedules, distance and time constraints will no longer separate us. And you can't miss worship because it will be there for you to engage when you are ready and able to engage it.

Interested?

So am I. I am presenting a 5-minute presentation of this major project to council when council meets again on Thursday, June 27th. I will also be sharing details of this throughout worship over the coming weeks, but a way for us to stay connected even when we are apart is my goal in this project not for me alone. This is for all of us.

I am one of two doctoral students currently in the program who is working to enhance the ministry setting where we are. The benefits of this work stay right here in Harford. The hub of this work will gather us to the website not now again but weekly, perhaps even daily. I am told the website will soon be on its way. My prayer and plan is for exciting connections to happen for us this September.

This study is intense and I welcome your ongoing prayers as I serve you, the people in and hopefully around the town of Harford.



Stewardship Meeting Minutes June 20, 2019



Meeting was called to order at 7:05 by President Craig Stout, and Pastor Will opened the meeting with a short prayer .

Secretary's report was reviewed and approved as submitted.

The Financial Secretary's Report for May showed us in good standing and meeting all obligations. Approved as submitted.

Julie shared Balance Sheet Detail, as well as Profit/Loss vs. Actual detail to date. The \$38,626 from sale of property is being held in Capital until all expenses on property are satisfied, at which time the Financial Committee will entertain options for best placement. Monies are coming in for the Golf Tournament, and Cabot revenue has increased to \$2,085. Harry Gardner is dealing with the roofing company regarding the leak, although their lack of returning phone calls is presenting a challenge. Treasurer's Report approved as presented.

For Old Business, the One Great Hour of Sharing was discussed with a focus on how to disperse the information in the form of envelopes and fliers. Ideas included (1) placement in the pews, (2) Facebook, (3) posters, and (4) Stewardship members sharing during services in July. Pastor Will plans to "weave" the info into his July Sermon Series for addition coverage. The Pledge Drive was then discussed with the Spire and using Call to Worship for attention-getters. The Stewardship Committee Responsibilities sheet was next on the agenda. Various revision suggestions from the group were gathered, and Sharon K. will create a "rough draft" to be reviewed at the July Meeting.

In New Business, Craig shared that Jen Housel conducts work-shops for Congregational Life, and he will contact her to see if she could present to us at the July meeting. This would help us to identify our individual skill sets to determine where we "meet" and "do not meet", making us more affective as a group.

Meeting adjourned at 8:15 with group prayers for anyone in our lives or neighborhoods who is a concern. Next meeting—July 18 @ 7:00PM.

Trustee Meeting Minutes

June 10, 2019



Old Business

RG Petty will not be quoting the reconstruction of the lecture hall foundation at this time as they are too busy right now.

Total price for replacing the driveway with concrete if we do all three areas is roughly \$85,000. Trustees move to have council vote on having the work done. Council has the quote from Benedict Construction. Placed on hold until the gutters are installed.

New gutters for the church are in the works. Trustees are discussing adding leaf-guards to the gutter project.

Seamless Gutters from Seamless Gutter and Supply Company \$12,400 for seamless gutters with Forever Gutter Guards.

The Quote from BSR for Gutters is \$6,136 for the gutters and \$4,536 for the gutter guards.

Trustees is in favor of the quote from Seamless Gutters because it is a better system. Council voted to go with the Seamless gutters with Leaf Guards.

Harry will speak with Terry Kavetski about a leaking window in the Church.

New Business

Talk to Benedict Construction about removing wire mesh from quote and adding Fiber Mesh to the Price per yard of Concrete from Masters

Rich Masters will call Liberty Carpet for an estimate on replacing carpet in high traffic areas of the new building with laminate flooring to match the existing flooring in lecture hall.

Church cupboard: Served 3 families and 2 individuals

Cradle Roll: Served on child with a letter and Christian book.

Pastor Relations: will meet July 29.

Christian Education: Did not meet

Willing Workers: Groups working on fair items.

Old Business: The sign was voted and approved during the congregational meeting. The sign company is having a promotional sale this month and has a higher resolution sign for only \$450 more. Council unanimously approved the improvement and the sign will be ordered. The electrical work needed for the sign will also improve the electrical needs at the front of the church with plugs and such. This cost will be covered by capital improvements. The freight, concrete and permit costs will be discussed at the next Council meeting when the exact costs are known.

New Business: The Meals on Wheels food program is reducing the number of meals per week from 5/week to 3/week. Many are concerned that this reduction with adversely impact our seniors both nutritionally and emotionally. Council is researching who is responsible for this cut back and how to best respond.

Missionary Group May 2019

We had a picnic to thank the helpers in the Yard Sale held at Lee's Furniture on Friday, May 24 and Saturday, May 25. We earned \$1656.85 to go to support a new sustainable food source program our Nicaraguan Missionaries are starting.

Pastor's Report

I met with Jen Housel who works for the Catholic Diocese in Scranton. She is offering a program to help the members of the church understand and share their gifts with others. This is a positive -based program where our strengths are identified and this is effective when we work as a team to understand all of God's gifts. There is an 90-minute instructional time that Jen will share with the Stewardship Committee who volunteered to be a part of this learning. It is our hope that this program goes to the entire congregation. First, however, Jen wishes this to start in a small group.

I spoke at length with the Boy Scouts when they had their Spud lunch here on ways they can become more involved in the community programs here at the church.

I officiated the wedding of Scott and Carrie Allen in Scranton on June 8th.

I am working with Tammy Stout on the upcoming fundraiser for ARC at the Lenoxville Rest Area.

I am working with Tammy and Craig Stout on the activity I will doing as the pastor during the Fair dinner.

I have made several personal phones calls to a pastor in the ministerium who is experiencing a challenge.

I have made visits to the shut ins and the specifics of these visits have been shared with the pastoral relations committee.

As for Lancaster Theological Seminary: I have completed my second year in the doctoral program. I have created a 28-page Major Project Proposal that includes a bibliography of over 50 resources (texts, articles, journals), and an annotated bibliography of 25 of those resources that gives a one, two or three paragraph explanation as to why these 25 primary resources will enhance my project. The Major Project Proposal also includes a literature review where I synthesized these resources into a conversation about what my project is, why my project is important to ministry at large, what I hope to learn from the project, what I'm bringing to the table in terms of the project as I start, what will measure the project, and how the project will come together.



Dear Friends,

Even as a conference minister, I think I have a pastor's heart. I do, in fact, worry about the spiritual health of our authorized ministers and our congregations. 
