DON'T silence your phones in church

We all been seated in an auditorium for one reason or another. Before the program, event or show begins, someone from backstage stands in front of the crowd and, after you hear a welcome and perfunctory remarks, you know what's coming next. "And please silence your cell phones at this time."

I don't want you to silence your phone in church. Instead, I want you to use it. Evangelism in this increasingly churchless age has never been more needed because there are now generations (plural) out there who misunderstand the basic tenants of the Christian faith, including the shared thought that Jesus is just a good guy, not the Son of God; so if you can share on social media a picture of your camping trip or an adventure with your family, why not share where you are on Sunday morning? More so, why don't you share what you heard in church, or what you're experiencing in church?

I understand that the thought of using a cell phone *during* worship will shock some of us. After all, this is not how church is done!

If you have not been in church over the past few weeks, what I'm suggesting may surprise you. Then again, when you consider how the missing age groups in the church communicate these days, even the most senior of us knows that the cell phone is used often by nearly all people under the age of fifty nearly all the time. This communication style is a way of life. Perhaps we could go so far as to say this communication style is *the* way of life for many today.

If so many churchless people are on their phones so often, doesn't it make sense to "fish for people" where the people actually are? Rather than waiting for lost generations to rush into worship on a Sunday morning, why don't we hear Jesus who calls us to go and make disciples in all of the nations (Matthew 28:19)?

For the past several Sundays, I have invited the use of cell phones particularly during and after the sermon. Inspired by Brandon Cox in *Rewired*, one the books I'm using in my dissertation, I invite the congregation to text me. I suggest this because thoughts, musings, questions or comments may come up during the sermon that you may want to ask and wouldn't do so otherwise. If you have thought or something to share, perhaps someone else is thinking the same thought, or all in worship will benefit from your addition. I never share who is texting me, and I have received messages that I have not addressed in church but later that day.

There is a short time where I answer questions in worship. This happens after the hymn that follows the sermon. The questions I have received from the congregation have been germane, important, thought-provoking, and real. I see this honoring our Congregational history, which values each individual.

If technology is enabling us to communicate more easily over distances, let's use technology to bridge the gap in the distances that are out there. The Gospel of Jesus Christ can be shared in incredible ways now in just seconds. Plus, as the sermon ruminates, you can text me throughout the week.

Some may not be in favor of cell phone use during worship. I think we can all understand this. I also think we understand that none of us are in favor of those who are missing church all together. Texting me and texting those in your communication circles about what you're learning and experiencing during or shortly after worship may be one of the best ways the Gospel can reach those who, at least for now, are not coming to church.



We've all entered a room in the house and wondered, "Why I am here?"

Here's another question. Why do you serve the LORD the way you do in an active, mission-based church? Can you answer beyond a sentence? If yes, is your answer going to make a non-believing listener hear something in your answer that will inspire their walk with Christ?

I continue to be inspired by the hardworking congregation I serve with, and when tasked in the 2019 GO FOR THE GOALS of bringing this congregation a Bible study, I knew something exciting needed to happen. Something new. Something bold. Something big.

Jesus is in the business of changing lives. And so am I. And so are you. To make this happen, over the four Sundays in October, four distinct, relevant churchwide Bible studies will happen—all at the same time! In four different locations at the same time, a 30-minute Bible study will follow worship. First though, we will have a guick, simple lunch in the Lecture Hall. (The food will be provided.)

My goal is to introduce more of us Bible studies. Let me say this more accurately. My goal is to introduce you to the THRILL of Bible studies. Singles, couples, family members, and dear friends, it's time to get deeper into the Word so we can reach deeper into our faith and find why we do what we do not for ourselves but for Savior—and with our Savior.

Four teachers will lead these direct, pertinent studies—Christian Character, Miracles, Decisions, and Waiting for God. No prior knowledge is needed. No homework is assigned. The teachers will move to a different study each week. So can you! You can stay with the same study or hop around each week.

I pray at least one of these relevant topics speaks to you—and, speaking of speaking—I also pray this gets great conversations going for more conversation and future study.

Each week in worship beginning on September 8th you will hear more about these four studies. Check next month's Spire for any details you may have missed.

Let me repeat. Jesus is in the business of changing lives. And so am I. And so are you. These mini studies can lead to major studies and major life changes can happen for you and those you love because you'll understand more fully "Why you are here."

Council Minutes

July 25, 2019

Pastor Will began the meeting at 6:33PM with a scripture reading (Colossians 2:6) and a prayer before the meeting.

Vice-President Maureen Warren called the meeting to order.

Financial Secretary, Dorothy Hagenbuch - June General Fund donations were down, however, the year to date amount was good. The freight and down payment on the sign have been sent to the sign company. The Golf committee would like to use up to \$4,000 of the Golf Tournament profit to cover what is needed for the sign installation, with the balance to go to General Fund.

Treasurer report-Connie Breese—The Money Market has a balance of \$3,419.51. \$16,467 was taken out for the sign which left \$30,696.24 in the other account. Half of the cost of the sign had to be made with the order. The payment of \$13,250 will be transferred to the sign company (Clayton Brumby). Julia and Connie will go to the bank to have help with transferring the money. There was a question about the money used to pay for the bell refurbishing; \$1,700 was to come out of the music fund and the rest out of the memorial fund. Profit and loss still shows the money we are still owed from the insurance company.

Christian Education-Kay Gow reported they did not have a meeting.

Choir-no report.

Church Cupboard-Maureen Warren reported that all is the same.

Clerk-Betty Lou had nothing to report.

Cradle Roll-Holli has added one new child to the list.

Deacons- Kay informed us that grandparents' day has been changed to October 13 and not in September.

GAME ON-the ARC fundraiser at the rest stop on Route 81 went well and they realized a profit of \$550. Thanks to everyone who baked for the fundraiser.

Historian-Kay had the numbers: June 30-55; July 7-56; July 14-78; July 21-41. Average 58.

Missionary-no report as they don't meet in July or August. Dottie did report that Will had sent a letter to Area Aging regarding our displeasure in the reduction of Meals on Wheels from 5 times a week to 3 times a week. Connie shared that she had read somewhere where the Area Aging is now not supplying napkins, etc. with the meals.

Nominating-Jacquie Phillips reported that they will meet in August.

Stewardship-Kay Gow reported that they have finalized the Stewardship Committee jobs. Maureen Warren reminded us that everything should come to council so that it can be approved and recorded. The sign is to be delivered the end of August. Judy will make copies of the committee's jobs for the next council meeting. They are working on the theme for the fall campaign – "Because He First Loved Us". Jen Housel's program is to find out one's strengths. The cost is \$20 per person per test and there are two tests. Stewardships suggestion to not pursue this project.

Trustees-parking lot and driveway repaving is on hold for a while. Talked about new carpet or flooring for the hallway in the addition. We should think about it being slippery when wet. Liberty gave them an estimate of \$10,000-\$12,000. Perhaps it should just be left as is and have it cleaned once a year. More than one quote should be collected. Connie suggested that while the electrician is here for the sign that he does the new dusk to dawn light behind the church. Will made a motion that the trustees proceed with installing a new dusk to dawn light in the rear of the church - motion carried. Gary Housel has removed the bird's nest that was located in the kitchen fan.

Willing Workers-will be meeting August 7, 2019, in the lecture hall at 7:00PM. The Attic Treasure ladies are working diligently on pricing the attic treasures. August 3 is the attic treasure deadline for bringing in items.

Pastor's report-I presided over the funeral of Jan Tator; had a great time at the ARC fundraiser at the Lenoxville Rest Area off I-81; have been tutored twice on how to enter my pastor's material to the church's new website; purchased and am designing (with a lot of help!) my own website for my dissertation project which begins September 8th two teens and I started our ice cream sandwich ministry. You could be visited next! Have finished reading all 27 library books that belong to the Lancaster Theological Seminary library; had my major project consultation at Lancaster Theological Seminary on July 10th. My project was approved. Graduation target date is May 9, 2020. Baptized Harper Lee Meshach; have been meeting by phone with Rev. Dr. David Popham, associate conference minister with the UCC conference in NJ. David is guiding me through my "ministry metaphor," a way to frame how ministry speaks to me and the congregation; was glad to see so many church folk at the benefit for Sandy Zupanovich. He reminded us that God called him to work for his doctorate degree while on a bus in New York City.

Golf Tournament: David asked if thank you letters had been sent. Judy and Dottie both said yes. The golf tournament will be at Tall Pines Golf Course in 2020. It will be held on a Saturday at 9:00AM on June 13, 2020. David asked about the final profit of the golf tournament. He also was requested to ask if there could be a handicap for golfers 65years young instead of 70 years. A good suggestion David had for 2020 was to include the amount of profit in the thank you letters and to also include the date, place and time of the next year tournament. He has been asked about next years' tournament and didn't have an answer. Some of the golfer participant will mark their calendar a year in advance if they like to golf on a certain course.

Pastor will closed the meeting with prayer at 7:33PM.

Recognition of three Important church groups who are doing the works the Lord has placed on their hearts.

The **Food Pantry** began 13 years ago as an idea Patricia White, the current pastor. Assisting her in this was Marcia Housel. The program provides individuals and families with food stuffs to help stretch their monthly groceries. It makes their lives a little less stressful by not having to worry about what they are going to have for a meal. Today Maureen Warren, Sharon Decker, and Dorothy Matthews ensure these needs are met.

Game -On came about five years ago because Melissa Heller, Craig and Tammy Stout wanted a place for their children and those in the community to have somewhere to go to have fun, play games, do crafts, have a nutritious snack and learn about Jesus and what He did and continues to do for them and us.

The **Missionary Group** is the oldest of these groups and has been a part of our historic church almost from its beginning. Books, clothing, and monetary donations have gone to many worthy causes (Heifer Project, Interfaith, Disaster Relief, Women's Resource Center and many others). The latest project in this long line is the support of two in-country missionaries in Nicaragua through the Child Health Evangelism organization, or CHE. They do this by having two rummage sales a year. CHE has many ministries among them are they teach women in the community a skill which helps provide extra income to their families. The women then teach the skill to others in their community. The children also benefit from a ministry that teaches them about Jesus and they then tell other children about Jesus. Most everything is donated; which is a blessing in and of itself. The ladies who do the quilts make about 25 a year. 


The 2019 Harford Fair Dinner

ICE CREAM MINISTRY: NO ONE SAYS NO TO ICE CREAM SANDWICHES WHEN WE SHOW UP ON THEIR LAWN

We are blessed as a church to have many outreach programs that enable our neighbors to experience God among us all. One of the ministries that directly reaches people in our local community is ice cream ministry. This ministry was started last summer by then pre-teen Mikaela Stout, who, with me in a car, heard God and wondered, "What if we just passed out ice cream to people around town?"

Her question started ice cream sandwich ministry which is now in its second year. Hailey Miller joined us this year and the girls really have taken to the joy of simply being present to people with a simple gift from the church. There are no strings to this ice cream. We do not ask for—and do NOT accept—money of any kind. This is just a simple gesture to let people know God is present where they are, and that we care about them here at the church.

We take ice cream ministry on the road. With the cooler packed with ice and the sandwiches wrapped, we set off in different directions. Ice cream melts, so we don't stay very long with the people we find. In fact,, our only challenge in passing out our God gift is finding people at home. More than once, the command to "Look for people!" has come with a smile.

We hope more people in our area catch on to our summer ministry because for many, we really surprise them when we pull into the driveway and jump out with the cooler and meet in them in their yards or knock on their door.

EIGHT GREAT GOD THINGS WE'VE LEARNED PASSING OUT LOVE IN THIS TOTALLY INEXPENSIVE, SIMPLE AND TASTY GIFT:

- 1. **No one** says no to ice cream sandwiches. (If someone does have a dairy or sugar issue, we invite them to keep the sandwiches in the freezer for a loved one to enjoy later.)
- 2. One of the best responses was from a man painting his house who said, "Thank you, God."
- 3. The Reuss family has an enormous rabbit.
- 4. After time in the backyard swimming pool, little kids really go for ice cream sandwiches.
- 5. In fact, kids just go for ice cream sandwiches. (No surprise there, right?)
- 6. Miller looks splendid wearing a hat made out of an empty ice cream sandwich box.
- 7. The construction crew working on the 547 bridge toward Gibson love not only ice cream sandwiches but also us. (Those sandwiches were GONE in seconds!)
- 8. People have bad days, or feel sad. Ice cream delivered makes a difference.

This ministry has been an outstanding gift for us. We understand more of what God must experience when God comes to us and tries to get our attention with something good.



Thank you for your letter concerning the changes to the delivery schedule of our meal delivery program, Meals on Wheels Endless Mountains. We understand your concern at the idea of cutbacks, and we are glad to report that no cutbacks are being made. However, we are working to transition to a delivery schedule of 3 days per week rather than five to create the necessary uniformity of service across the counties we serve. Fortunately, meal recipients will continue to receive the same number of meals and supplementary nutrition benefits they have always enjoyed through the program. A hot meal will continue to be delivered on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, with prepared and easily heated frozen meals offered in substitution for Tuesday and Thursday hot meals.

We wholeheartedly recognize that our meal recipients benefit not only from the supplementary nutrition offered by Meals on Wheels, but also from the socialization offered by a daily visit. We think that you will be happy to know that we are encouraging use of our volunteer programs such as Telephone Reassurance callers and Friendly Visitors to make sure the social needs of our seniors are being cared for.

We greatly appreciate you taking the time to show your concern for seniors; we can certainly say we share your passion for the aging community. We also greatly appreciate your offer of help, because we can never have too many helpful hands. In this, we would gladly welcome volunteers to become Friendly Visitors and Telephone Reassurance Callers. We would be grateful to have you share these volunteer opportunities with your congregation. 
