

God, love and laughter, a review of our February sermon series By Pastor Will

Have you noticed that most of us need to laugh more? Headlines can be hard, our daily lives can have challenges, but here's the bottom line in the four-part February sermon series called *God, Love and Laughter*: We need to laugh more! We need to hold to what our God is joyfully doing in our lives—and that's creating moments of deep joy and great laughter.

Sometimes God is using the hard places in our lives to get our attention, or draw us out of who we are so that we can be who He intends us to be.

In the story of Jesus and the two fishing boats which we opened on February 6, we see that Jesus calls the professional fisherman out *again* to do what they had failed at the night before, and that's fish successfully. When following Jesus' instruction, two boats come back with enormous amounts of fish! This text in Luke 5 speaks to Jesus' bounty for us. His provisions for us are great. We don't need to fear or stress over not having enough (and here I'm thinking about out annual budget and our monthly expenses) because God does what God does. When we follow Him, He gives us more than what we need!





In the story we had on Scout Sunday, February 13, we learn that Jesus calls his disciples by name. (Their names are listed in Luke 6.) Jesus calls us by name, too. We find joy when the Isaiah text Jesus highlights is fulfilled (Isaiah 55). When we are used by God to bless the poor, help the hungry and be present with those who grieve, we experience what is the Holy Spirit at work in our lives, and that is joy. When one among us is poor, hungry or hurting, we do not—we cannot—experience joy or laughter. When we work together with God to fulfill His mission in and around Harford? Joy can be felt. Laughter can be heard.

And love wins again.

In the story of Sarah and Abraham on February 20, love does win. When we reach inside this text, we understand that God blesses Sarah because this woman who grows into her faith realizes she is blessed long before she becomes pregnant. In Genesis 21, Sarah laughs when she learns she will be a mother because she has already found delight in the Lord. This delight—this joy, this laughter—is ours too. Remember this verse. And Sarah said, "God has made me laugh, and all who hear will laugh with me (Genesis 21:6)."

Let's laugh with Sarah.



Jonah's story is our story, too by Pastor Will

Jonah finds himself in quite the predicament. He is stuck in the belly of a big fish for three days.

We find ourselves stuck sometimes, too. Like Jonah, we can't see our way out of the situation we are in. Like Jonah, we can turn to God and praise Him and the fact that He is with us in our scary, dark, and uncertain places.

Jonah has been assigned a ministry he does not like. It is a call he does not respond to. In fact, he runs from it!



We are assigned ministries, too. Sometimes—gulp—we don't like them. Like being trapped in a fish for three days, these ministries are not comfortable. However, just as Jonah did, we can find God with us in these ministries we are called to provide.

When I stand at the pulpit or see the congregation in a different setting, I see what God sees: a group of people willing (and sometimes a little less than willing!) to take on what God will have us do. I see this, too. Once we engage what God will have us do, we, like Jonah, are set free.

I am convinced God is putting something on your heart that you can do with joy for His Kingdom. I don't know what this ministry or mission is, but you do! And I mean what I say. You'll have joy in this. Laughter will come.

And this is what our February sermon series has been all about—God, love and laughter. I imagine when Jonah's days in Nineveh are over and, with time, he looks back on them, he likely chuckles—or all out laughs. HOW he avoided what God put before him IS comical. Well, it's comical until we get to him being in a fish for three days. That's not so funny. But I'm certain Jonah laughed with God once he saw that what God had him do would be such a blessing.

If you're feeling stuck these days, or if you sort of feel like you're in the belly of a fish for far too long, I invite you to do what Jonah did—and that is seek the salvation of the Lord. Just as God did with Jonah, you will set you free.

I can hear this once fish-smelling man chuckle or all out belly laugh when, long past his work for God in Nineveh, he laughs. Can you hear this, too? Jonah laughs because God is God. He is the Creator who keeps creating for us opportunities to give to Him and serve Him with our whole hearts.

This sermon series isn't truly ending. We will find love and laughter together in the months ahead. As we connect further with God and each other, we will know God, love and laughter.

An Ash Wednesday Reflection

Even now, says God, return to me with your whole heart, with fasting and weeping and mourning; rend your hearts not your garments, and return to your God. For gracious and merciful is God, slow to anger, rich in kindness, and relenting in punishment. — Joel 2: 12-18.

The call to repentance is steeped in our Judeo-Christian DNA. It is who we are to a God who ways is speaking love to us.

On this ashen day, the start of the holy season of Lent, it is important that each of us pauses to look back and reflect on the thoughts and actions of time passed. We allow ourselves the opportunity to feel the collision of pain caused by negative words, ideas, and deeds with the strong desire for goodness that God asks of every person. In this reflection, we are honest about the feelings and emotions that accompany our thoughts. Honesty with ourselves allows for our openness to God, and our opportunity to be with God.

Repentance does not mean pain and sorrow alone. Repentance also brings joy because repentance is a commitment to change for the future. This commitment is to the prospect of being more Christlike to one's self, to our family and our friends, our church and our wider community, and, most importantly, to God.

As we build a more honest relationship with ourselves, we build a closer relationship to God. This relationship is the platform for truth, compassion, and justice to a world desperate for repentance yet likely doesn't even know what repentance is.



Can we rethink Lent?

I read what I immediately found to be true. People often don't look forward to Lent.

I get it. You may, too.

With so much is taken away from us these days, Lent can seem like one more thing that is hard or burdensome. It certainly isn't something many consider fun, energizing, or uplifting.

This is sad because this is not true.



Sure, many of us hold childhood memories of giving up chocolate, or attending more worship services during this season. Additionally, words like "sacrifice," "discipline," and "self-denial" are used in ways that suggest Lent is something to be endured rather than appreciated as a time of grace, renewal, revisioning and profound, and even enjoyable, spiritual growth.

This is also sad.

Rather than lose Lent, rethink its opportunity. If you are not embracing the gift of Lent this year for whatever reason, clear your mind because even the *thought* of resetting Lent is helpful.


Welcome Lent as a time to realign, return, and even rejoice. Consider this time a gift, not a grind because each year the Church gives us six weeks to take a long, loving look at our lives. Here we see if our values and priorities are in line with God's desires for us. Since most of us find that we've wandered from God's path, Lent becomes that second chance, that do-over. With relief, it is time to "return to God with our whole heart."

Here are some ways you can rethink the approach and the practice of Lent.

- Worship without music or talk radio in the car. That's right. Pure silence. I know a woman in our congregation who has done this. At first, this may feel unnatural, but trust me, the conversations you will have with God will be your joy in short time.
- Draw, paint, doodle, or sketch. Who said Lent always had to be the Word?
- Write. I know you're like me in that you WELCOME a REAL letter from a REAL person in the US Mail! Take time that you can create as sacred and connect with loved ones by pen and paper.
- Visit. Yep. Just schedule time with someone in the way that works for you. I invite you to take this practice intentionally, not casually.
- Name names. Maybe you are in a silent car, or vacuuming, or baking, or building, or tinkering with something, but make it a practice to name names. You'll know what to do with these names once they come to your mind.
- Create a playlist of hymns. The oldies but goodies ARE the best, yes. But seek those you don't know, too.
- Walk. Maybe you'll be pushing a walker around the house, or maybe you'll climb one of our great Appalachians, but walk. Be mindful of your breath, your thoughts, and your joy in being outdoors.
- Read prayers. Hear an author whose voice is so different from yours.
- Buy a book whose author presents the Gospels in a way that piques not just your interest, but your heart.

There's a pastor who will be walking an entire congregation through Lent each Sunday. You can find the message of God in a church you know in Harford.





Lenten Service Schedule

The Route 11 Corridor Ministerium returns! This year we pick up the tradition that was cancelled last year due to the severity of Covid. 

Council Minutes—February 10, 2022

Vice-president, Maureen Warren began the meeting in absence of our President. There were ten members attending—Peg Empet, Julia Gardner, Kay Gow, Will Hagenbuch, Ellen Holdredge, Judy Mitchell, Wendy Phillips, David Schulte, Maureen Warren, Kandy Wellman.

President David arrived and relieved Maureen of taking care of the meeting up to this point.

David reminded us that the first meeting of the year is to elect a council president. A motion was made by Maureen, seconded by Ellen to nominate Dave for council president. All in favor, motion carried.

First on David's agenda was to re-organize the finance committee. He would like this meeting to take place on February 24 instead of having another council meeting in February. People on this finance committee are: Maureen Warren, Nancy Burris, Connie Breese, Julia Gardner, Holli Chichester, and David Schulte. David will personally call everyone to alert them to the change in meetings and to let them know that the finance committee will meet on February 24 instead of council. Council will meet in March on the 24th at 6:00. Julia felt that someone from each committee should be on this finance committee. David would like a list of all assets presented at this meeting, and what the money is earning to get a plan in motion for the church's finances.

Christian Education-Kay shared Holli's minutes of the last Christian Education meeting. They were averaging 18-26 children per Sunday spread over five classes-Nursery, Pre-K-Kindergarten, Grades 1-2-3, Grades 4-5-6 and a Youth Class (Junior and Hight school). Two of our teachers had to step down due to work and other stressors (Tatiana MacDowell, and Kassandra Lamberson) They will be missed. Two new teachers stepped up to take the PK-Kindergarten class—Ellen Holdredge and Adele Bennett. We are so thankful to them. The Christmas pageant was successful with only half of the children able to participate as there was a rampant stomach flu circling among the children. There were two weeks off for Christmas and New Year and 1 week of because of weather. We started back on January 16, 2022, with 26 children and promptly had to close due to COVID. If Mountain View School closes due to COVID, we also cancel Sunday School. One congregant pledged enough money in 2022 to cover the curriculum for 1 year.

Choir-Ellen shared that the choir is practicing. They have been invited to perform at the Peace of the Pascal Lamb, a Masonic event at the Masonic Temple on April 2, 2022 at 3:00. Public is invited. There was a request from the Deacons that during the offering there be an instrumental or have the choir sing.

Church Cupboard-Maureen shared that one family is being served.

Clerk-No representative, no report.

Cradle Roll-Kay shared Holli's notes that four children/families were served by the Cradle Roll in January.

Deacons-Kay shared Holli's minutes. Linda Lindsey brought a program to the Deacons' attention-Senior Companion Program. It is a program through the Area Agency on Aging that matches persons over 55 and income qualified that matches a volunteer with a senior that would like to have some company and a friend. The benefits to the companion are a meaningful volunteer experience. The program has benefits of travel and meal reimbursement, stipend, recognition and training. **Meals on Wheels-**this program will be researched and contacted for ways that our congregation can reach out into the community. A Valentine Day Card and small bag of goodies will be delivered by the congregation and the Deacons to homebound who would appreciate the gesture. Ellen suggested to remember the teens upstairs helping with the technical production as a thank you. It was decided to keep the Communion Elements to pre-packaged for the present. Singing during worship was discussed. It was thought that we should strive to limit hymns to 1-2 verses if possible and to limit the offertory music to instrument or the choir. New Member class will begin on March 13 and continue for five weeks. We plan to continue with asking committee representatives to join for a class. We will have the class after the worship service and will begin at 11:15 to 12:45. A small lunch will be provided. Each class will have a co-teacher Deacon to team with Pastor Will to help guide the conversations and agenda. Linda Lindsey will be our council representative from May to October. Kay Gow will be deacon representative from November to April. **Bible study-**"Meeting the Spirit" led by Craig Stout is going very well. Several people have asked for an alternative time due to conflicts. Craig will start another "Meeting the Spirit" Bible study on February 21, 2022, at 6:30 at the church. Next Deacon meeting is Sunday, February 20 at 6:00 pm in person and by Zoom.

Least Coin: Wendy told us about a Syracuse University student who is doing an internship in France, teaching immigrants to speak, write and understand French in order to be able to cope with their new lives in France.

Correspondence: Karen read a note from Joyce Berish who appreciated hearing from us in December. Cards were signed and will be sent out.

Care Package to Evan Clarkson was assembled and readied to send out. A card, signed by all, was included in the package.

The meeting to make the sauce for the pulled pork was tentatively set for the afternoon of 2/22 Next meeting: March 15, 2022

Nominating-Wendy shared no report for this month.

Pastoral Committee-David is planning on getting the finance committee together. David agreed to have a service ready in case Will has to miss a Sunday.

Stewardship-Peg reported that at the last meeting they discussed the budget and the financial situation of the church.

Technical Committee-Michelle reported that they will be having a meeting after church next week. David suggested that we add the Technical Committee to the by-laws.

The annual meeting was broadcast on You Tube. Was that okay to do that. After discussion, yes the group decided that that was okay broadcast the meeting.

Trustees– January: Kandy shared that Brandon Bennett is not doing the plowing. Who is plowing? Harry had called Brendan Herbert. He is plowing and also has the equipment to spread cinders/gravel on the icy parking lot and driveway. Irv asked about installing air conditioners in the kitchen. After discussion it was decided that they were not needed, plus there was no extra money to pay for such conveniences. There is a ceiling exhaust fan, plus the floor fans are also very helpful when cooking in the summer. Gary bought a new light to install by the double doors in the Gathering Room. Hopefully this will be a brighter light at night and also to shine a little bit into the driveway. Discussed rug cleaning. The cost was less than \$200. The group felt that it might be better to have the carpet cleaned twice a year.

February: Trustees have set the date for the annual Spring Clean-up for April 23 with a rain date of April 30th Kandy spoke with Gary about getting quotes to replace the deck of the lecture hall porch with composite decking this summer. Harry updated the emergency contact information with the emergency monitoring service provider. Brendan Herbert will plow and cinder the parking lot for the rest of this winter. Trustees will look into other options before next winter.

Quarterback Monday AM meeting-Judy reported regarding the Monday morning quarterback meetings the following. We missed a few meetings in January. Lately the meetings have been virtual. We discuss people mentioned on Sunday and in the prayer list. If anyone has an update on anyone we will share this information. We discuss worship service such as the audio sound, etc.; we discuss upcoming activities.

Willing Workers-Ellen shared that there were eight in attendance at the last quarterly Willing Workers' meeting. They discussed the April 9, roast beef dinner plus considering different dinners. Some ladies asked about indoor dining. Last year was all take out. After discussion regarding dining in or out, it was decided that yes, if folks wanted to dine in they would be free to do so. Council left it up to the Willing Workers to decide what they would like to do.


Meeting the Spirit — Bible Study


