

Pastor's Page: Be a kid at Christmas

I was in my mid-twenties when someone shared something that felt a bit sad to me in the moment. A woman well into her eighties said, "My husband and I will only set up a small Christmas tree this year."

She was sharing how much work a big tree in their living room would be. She added, "And we don't spend much time in that room. What's the point?"

A practical person, she shared the couple would enjoy a small, tabletop tree in their kitchen.

How could Christmas be turned down so much, I thought at the time.

Now, I think how truly inspiring (and informative) it was that the two seniors actually put up a tree in their home. Lights are lights, whether there are 10,000 individual lights on a towering, ten-foot tree, or less than 100 lights on a two-foot tree. Christmas doesn't have to be loud, big, or over the top.

But Christmas is Christmas.

This can make us all wonder what "Christmas is Christmas" means. As Christians, how can we experience Christmas beautifully and meaningfully? Ten-foot Christmas trees can certainly be something. I smile when I add that two-foot Christmas trees can be something, too.

Maybe there's no tree at all.

Christmas being Christmas can be that in some sparkling, renewing, and wonderful way, we all get to be kids again—at least in part. By this, I mean we can all reenter the story of the angel Gabriel visiting Mary.

Mary devoutly practiced her Jewish faith. She loved God. She went about her day-to-day life as we do, and as the couple I mentioned did. She had no idea of the grand plans God had for her life. She may never have even thought that God would have grand plans for her life.

This is interesting. Mary did what we can all do: she was faithful. Period. She wasn't faithful to gain or get anything other than a connection with God. She likely never said, "If I hang in there long enough, I'll get some grand reward." Like the woman who, with her husband, chose a small Christmas tree, Mary took her life and her walk with God practically. No big thrills (and no big trees).

God did to Mary what God does to all of us each Christmas. He gives. Specifically, He gives a message. The message is one of hope, peace, love and joy. We will not receive a message like the one Mary heard from the angel Gabriel, but there is message, nevertheless.

I am not sure what your message will be, but your message (like my message) will come when we let Christmas be Christmas. Large or small, grand or tall (or not so tall!), we can find the meaning and the message of Christmas by simply being present to the Word of God, and to the promises of God.

Be present. Be faithful. Be attentive. Be connected to God and God will give the joy of Himself to us.

While we will not receive what Mary received—the news of an upcoming virgin birth—we will get what Mary had, which is the feeling inside of knowing that Jesus, Emmanuel, God with us, is on His way to us.

Be a kid at Christmas. Expect the wonderful—even if the wonderful comes in a brilliantly small and beautiful way.



Making the New Year meaningful: 4 ways to let God be God

As the new year approaches, we have a reset, a turn-the-page moment.

Welcomed, unwelcomed, observed, or not so observed, we will arrive at the time of wondering what the new year will hold for us, or, how we as Christians will hold and share our love of Jesus with others.

It may begin with the word "happy." After all, we say and hear "Happy New Year!"



World-renowned psychiatrist and existential philosopher Viktor E. Frankl, M.D., Ph.D. once referred to the pursuit of happiness. He said, "Don't aim at success—the more you aim at it and make it a target, the more you are going to miss it. For success, like happiness, cannot be pursued; it must ensue and it only does so as the unintended side-effect of one's dedication to a cause greater than oneself or as the by-product of one's surrender to a person other than oneself. Happiness must happen, and the same holds for success: you have to let it happen by not caring about it."

True happiness, Dr. Frankl wisely espoused, comes from relating to something greater than or someone other than yourself—a timeless, *meaning-centric* principle known also as self-transcendence. In other words, 2024 can be the start of better times if we let happiness *ensue* (in a self-transcendent way) rather than try to *pursue* it.

Christians, be aimed toward something greater! To the faithful, the something greater is, of course, God.

As we move from December into January, let God be God. Let the joy of following God, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit be the joy and the meaning in our lives not just at the kickoff this January but throughout the year.

In 2024, we can stop searching for happiness and start searching for meaning.

To look for meaning, we can stop focusing on resolutions. Why resolutions often don't work is because they start from the outside and work in. People think about how they want to change and then are surprised when they can't sustain the hard work and dedication required to make a huge life shift.

Often people make lofty goals at this time of year that don't pan out. For example, someone who never works out hits the gym for a week only to find that such a demanding routine isn't sustainable.

I'm not saying we shouldn't try to get healthier or stop an unhealthy habit. This is important! If, however, you've struggled with sustained success, a different approach begins when we let God be God.

Our focus on God makes our lives meaningful. Here are four ways to stay focused on God.

Start your day by dedicating it to God.

Begin each day with a prayer of thanksgiving and praise. You don't even need to leave your bed to do this! Surrender your plans and goals to God. Yes, this spiritual practice can be habit forming and will help you stay focused on His will for your life rather than worrying about what lies ahead or letting the world's noise dictate your day's direction.

Read the Bible daily.

Reading scripture is the most powerful way to stay focused on God. This helps you remember His promises for your life. Set aside time to read the Bible and meditate on its words, even if it's just for a few minutes. Perhaps you'll look for what I send each Tuesday, which is the scripture intro. This centering on the text will prepare you to hear the upcoming sermon at its fullest and will help keep you grounded in Him as it will remind you of His faithfulness.

Making the New Year meaningful: 4 ways to let God be God Continued...

Spend time in prayer.

Take time each day to talk with God. Express your fear and gratitude. Pour your heart into Him. This will help you stay connected with God, and He will let you see your circumstances from an eternal perspective.

Be in a community of believers.

Surround yourself in a community of believers. This helps you stay grounded in your faithfulness to God. And yes, participate in corporate worship. This doesn't mean "watching" worship, of course. Participating in a community of believers means reaching out specifically to those you worship with care, devotion, and love.

When we focus our attention on God, we find we dedicate ourselves to His service easily, naturally, and obviously. This focus on God makes our relationship with Him deepen. In a self-transcendent way, our joy expands. Our lives have meaning. Our direction is clear.

Scripture tells us that "those who look to Him are radiant (Psalm 34:5)." Let's let this radiance shine here in 2024! Join us for worship weekly. Be a part of our community daily.

Dear Lord,

We turn to You (or return to You) at this time in this prayer. Help us hear You. Help us understand that Your love for us is not idle, and that, in turn, our love for you is not idle. Move us. Inspire us. Direct us. Call us to worship. Stay persistent with us to attend church collectively so that yes, we experience the body of Christ together.

You are radiant. May this radiance shine in us and through us as we follow Your Son, our Savior, by way of the Holy Spirit.

Leaning on others

It's what we do. It may even be what we do best. We lean on each other.

I have shared we can listen and learn from each other. When we listen and learn to intentionally hear and then understand someone, then the one heard and understood is blessed, thankful. This may sound obvious, even simple. What is neither obvious nor simple is a phrase found in Galatians 6. Here Paul, the author of Galatians, mentions "the law of Christ."

Scholars offer different insights into what, exactly, is this law of Christ. What most biblical experts agree on is "the law of Christ" likely refers to the two commandments Christ Jesus shares: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength" and "You shall love your neighbor as yourself."

Paul argues that the law given to Moses at Sinai does not speak specifically to those who believe in Christ. Paul then appeals to the Galatians. He advises his listeners to hold to a Christ-like mindset by walking in the Spirit, and being led by the Spirit. A way to walk in the Spirit and be led by the Spirit is to lean on each other. When we lean on each other, we listen and we learn. When we listen, learn and lean on each other, misunderstandings are overcome. Connections that may have been shaky are solid. Joy that seemed so far away is suddenly close and shareable.

In an October 2014 online article titled, "When You Don't Understand, Lean on Jesus," Ernest Angley speaks to leaning on Jesus, particularly when it comes to listening and to learning. Angley doesn't say this outright but suggests the best listener we can learn from is Jesus Himself.

Angley shares peacekeeping wisdom, yet I respectfully disagree with him when he writes, "You can bring troubles upon yourself when you are not justified in the eyes of God. When you accuse God or blame Him for things, you will not get His help; and He will back away." I cannot imagine God backing away. The God I know and experience firsthand never backs away. Ever. Backing away, turning a shoulder, or keeping distant or silent is not what God does. In fact, this is the opposite of what God does. God pursues. God persists. And God is also patient.

I do agree with Angely when in the article he adds we can also get into trouble when we do not use God's wisdom. Angley sites James 1:5, "If you need wisdom, ask our generous God, and he will give it to you. He will not rebuke you for asking (NLT)."

God's wisdom comes from His Word. His wisdom and compassion also come when we listen to, learn from and lean on each other. God's Word also directs us. Scripture can even challenge us to move from places of despair to soft landings of comfort. How? We can lean on each other.

Lean on someone. Go ahead. Give them your weight. Expect the same weight, or even more weight, back. No one is alone when it comes to gray days or melancholy moments. We can all blanket, cover, ignore, or simply move as if this is fine, or somehow okay. But something far better to do is to lean on someone. In turn, let someone lean on you. And for this you will both be thankful.

Willing Worker Big Group Meeting November 1, 2023

The quarterly meeting of the Willing Workers Big Group was held in the lecture hall on November 1, 2023. The meeting was called to order by Kay Gow at 1;00. Others present were: Ivie Simons, Sharon Decker, Kandy Wellman, Sharon Kinney, Peg Empet, Ellen Holdredge. A motion to accept the minutes as printed was made by Sharon K with 2nd by Kandy. Passed. Sharon K presented the treasurer's report. Profit from the roast beef dinner --\$2,518.68 (\$300 less than last year). Harford fair profit was \$7,845.47 (\$1300 less than last year). There was a discussion on why profits were down. Kandy requested a category breakdown from the fair to see how each area (crafts, edibles, treasures, knives) did.

OLD BUSINESS:

Roast beef dinner. Sharon Decker bought 3 dinners. One was missing a piece of pie, one was missing a roll, and one was missing coleslaw. Hopefully this was the only time that happened.

Harford Fair. More was spent on tickets this year so we need to work with the fair dinner people to be more prudent in the purchase of tickers.

Kandy wondered at what point she should stop ordering knives. In other words, how much longer are we going to be able to have the members and energy to keep doing a fair booth. She has decided, with approval from the group, to not reorder items that don't sell well. She will just let them sell out.

There is always a worry that the fair will tear down the building that we are now in. The space is not ideal as it is. Kandy will contact someone at the fair and put in a request for a different space, if one opens up, like down by where Master's Concrete has their space or somewhere better suited to our purposes. There were a few pounds of chocolate fudge left. The year before we ran out on Friday. Peg suggested that we put a sign outside saying fudge and cookies available inside—Kandy will make a sign. Fudge bag order for next year will just be for the ½ pound bags.

Stove is fixed. The re-ignitor wasn't working.

NEW BUSINESS: Kandy made a motion to pledge \$7,000 to the general fund and \$800 to OCWM. 2nd by Kay. Passed

ELECTION OF OFFICERS: Ivie made a motion to retain the same slate of officers. 2nd by Peg. Kay Gow-President, Sharon Decker-Vice President, Ellen Holdredge-Secretary, Sharon Kinney-Treasurer. Passed

On December 3, the Willing Workers will be lighting the advent candle so whomever is in church should come up front at that time.




