#### LENT 2020: How the suffering servant still relieves suffering today

Think of the times we moved out of the way so that Jesus could be the way, the truth, and the light in someone else's life. Those awesome ministry moments are such a high!

Disciples Peter, James and John experienced such an awesome ministry moment when, called apart from the others, they climbed this spectacular mountain and witnessed at its summit the absolute marvel of a transfigured Jesus who was *dazzling* white. Perhaps those moments aren't just for Peter, James and John. I think we can experience them, too. How? We get our Jesus on.

The phrase may be a little campy to some, but "Get our Jesus on" is the sermon series that takes us through the six weeks of Lent. I titled this series this way so that we can easily recall it. "Get your Jesus on" aims at our understanding of why we need to get our Jesus on so that it is Jesus who is seen when others look at us. It is Jesus who is heard when we speak. It is Jesus who is experienced when we act.

How Jesus is seen, heard and experienced in us has everything to do with patterning our lives after Jesus, the suffering servant spoken of in the ancient text of Isaiah 53, also known as Second Isaiah. Getting our Jesus on is never about our own glory or our own gain.

Through prayer and scriptural research, I would like to share that this 2020 6-part Sunday morning Lenten series aligns us to our servant's place in this world. Humility is our role as we follow and understand the wounds in our world in the way our Savior did. We do not take the place of Jesus; instead, we will see more fully through this series what his suffering on the cross does in our lives and in the lives we are called to minister to, care for, and love.

Our world needs to be ministered to, cared for, and loved. We do this best by understanding, embracing, and then putting into action sacred text like this one which we will open and embrace on March 22<sup>nd</sup>.





#### **Pancake Supper**





#### **Council Minutes**

#### 1-30-2020

**Financial Secretary Report**: Dottie Hagenbuch – Income in January was \$9732.80 under Budget.

Treasurer's Report: Julia Gardner – Will put income/expense Summary in the Spire each month

and also show YTD figures.

\$372.00 was approved to pay for the church's payroll application.

**Trustees:** Harry Gardner - Problem with the Fire Alarm gong off when the power cuts off. The company has said that we need a new system (\$3100). Trustees will look into other products.

**Missionary:** Holli Chichester- The MountainView principal has asked for snacks to help feed children that do not have snacks. Missionary Group would like to collect snacks for this program. Council voted to allow the collection of snacks for MountainView Elementary.

#### **Council Business:**

- It has been suggested that a Suggestion Box be set up. Council voted to get a Suggestion Box (Dave Schulte will acquire) and place it on the Counter in the Gathering Room. All suggestions will go to Pastoral Relations for review.
- 2. The Memorial Fund usage was reviewed. In the future Council will considered items that will enhance or improve the church for funding out of the Memorial Fund.
- 3. Gus Lotter and George Ferrara suggested that the church should have an AED. Council voted to purchase one using the Memorial Fund (est \$1300). Gus and George will be asked to help locate the proper machine and person to educate those interested in using the machine.
- 4. Council also voted to offer "Stop the Bleeding" training to Christian Education, youth workers and others interested (Dave Schulte will set up the training).
- 5. By-Laws: will be reviewed by a committee (Craig Stout, Judy Mitchell, Holli Chichester)
   Items for reviews states that the annual report be in the mail 10 days prior to the meeting
   -states that congregational meeting must be notified by mail

-committee member attendance

-will bring items for change to the February meeting

- 6. Council voted to keep the January Council meeting on the 4<sup>th</sup> Thursday of the month. The last year's members will attend. The new representatives can start in February.
- 7. Council voted to not include the final financials in the Annual Report (the figures are not available in time to get the annual report in the mail 10 days prior to the annual meeting). The final financials will be available on the web, via email and at the office.
- 8. The office computer is very out-of-date and needs to be replaced. The council voted to purchase a new computer and software with Memorial funds. Gus Ferrara will be consulted.
- 9. The new color printer required maintenance due to improper usage. The printer required two new drums and a maintenance call. The printer now has a code that restricts use. Those needing copies can ask Judy Mitchell to print for them. If Judy is unavailable, Holli Chichester can make copies.

- 10. The Escrow Capital money in the budget was discussed. We have been placing \$6000/year into the Capital Account for future needs. Trustees will be asked to determine how much should be kept for future needs.
- 11. Sign -the sign will receive landscaping in the Spring:

-only church activities and non-profits will be advertised on the sign

-Tammy and Craig Stout will schedule the sign slides

-Holli Chichester has received training as an alternate. Any others interested in learning how the sign works should talk to Tammy Stout.

-Any funds remaining in the Sign Fund after the landscaping will be moved to the General Fund.

- 12. The remaining Gold Tournament Funds were moved into the General Fund.
- 13. Some members mentioned that too many Out-Reach Programs were happening in November and December. Holli Chichester said that the Disaster Kits were an unplanned project due to the unplanned hurricane. The Operation Christmas Child program will also be moved to the end of October to the middle of November

14. Dave Schulte was elected Council President and Maureen Warren was elected Vice-President.

**Pastor's Report:** As we begin this new year, it's time to envision with God what our future holds. What ministries are in store for us? What makes us fearful of new ideas, and what faith is required to first listen and then respond to the voices around us who are calling us further into servanthood here at the church God gave us to use for His Kingdome on Earth?

I remain deeply impacted by the UCC church in Tannersville that closed this past fall due to a lack of many things: vision, planning, goal-setting, hope and, above all, faith in a God who does not keep His people still, but continually and constantly challenges and inspires us to see what beauty and promise await those who seek first the Kingdome of God I just mentioned.

The Weinberg Food Pantry opportunity we have been given by grace is outstanding. In addition to the fine and faithful efforts of our own church cupboard, which, according to Maureen Warren at our Annual Meeting will not be affected by our upcoming monthly food distributions, we have the opportunity and the privilege to feed the hungry. THIS is what we're CALLED to do! Amen!

Let us be mindful of this pantry which provides food at no cost to those individuals and families that experience economic hardship. Our neighbors ARE hungry! Ingrid Balsamo spoke passionately and professionally when she mentioned from the pulpit on January 26<sup>th</sup> that food gaps and shortages exist in our neighborhoods. Quality, healthy meals are being forfeited to cover costs elsewhere.

This is not acceptable and we have a way to address this! Notify your neighbors of this tremendous free resource that will benefit so many people at no charge whatsoever. Now is not the time we as a congregation are silent. I will be using this gift as a foster dad of five children, and I'm grateful for this help-as we all should be.

Being a foster dad, as many of you know, has been the GREATEST gift in my life. My days are filled with the love and laughter AND hard work! These children come from severe neglect and each has issues I invite you to pray over daily with me. They are wonderful, remarkable children and the next weeks and months ahead are in God's hand when we give this situation to him.

We are called to pray. This past Tuesday Night, we were called by God to be present to the boy's night of JV and HS boys' basketball where we, as a church, handed out flowers to cancer survivors. Along with Craig Stout center court, I had a time to share testimony about the power of prayer and church life. We had an awesome experience in the community.

I have been blessed to visit many of you over the past few weeks. These home visits have been gifts to both you and to me, and I'm grateful our God has put us together.

I am grateful too, for this congregation and the hardworking efforts and energies you, people of God, continue to put forth in the community we are called to love and to serve.

Communion Box was hung in the sanctuary. The suggestion box is not ready, but we believe responsibility should be moved to Pastoral Relations and then they can pass down the suggestions to the various committees as needed.

We are still wondering if we should decorate the tree in the front yard. It is thought that maybe if the kids decorate it, it will bring ownership to it and include them. Is it too much for the children to do? Should we have extras for church members to be able to hang? We will ask Christian Education to take this to see if they will take this on.

We will start discussing Easter at our next meeting.

Next Meeting will be March 8, 2020 following Worship.

#### **Missionary Group:**

-Least Coin: Bangladesh – Work with 100 people (80% women) and improving their health and nutrition.

-Outreach Project: The principle of Mountain View Elementary School has asked for assistance providing healthy snacks to children that don't have snacks. The teachers get a bag of 20 snacks/month to be used when children are without. This project was approved by Council and will continue until the end of March for April. The Hop Bottom United Methodist Women will cover May. The Boy Scouts will also help.

-Summer Lunch Box Program: Peanut Butter is 10 for 10 at Price Chopper.

-Disaster Kit Drop Off: Broome County/Binghamton April 27 10-2.

-Soup Day: We will make Soup March 3 at 1:00. Beef Vegetable. We will use the dehydrated vegetables in the church cupboard and the roast beef left from the Roast Beef Dinner. The soup will go to fill the Soup Ministry needs.

-Shower of Blessings: We will hold a Shower for the Women's Resource Center and CareNet through the month of April. We will have a light reception May 3, 2020 so that the congregation can see what has been collected. We will advertise in the March Spire.

-Next meeting: March 24, 2020 at 1:00.

#### Stewardship:

Dottie shared the Financial Report for January, indicating that \$12,500 per month is needed to cover church expenses. We were \$3,000 short for the first month of the year. Some discussion followed as to whether the Cabot monies could maybe go into the General Fund instead of Capital. This would be a decision for council.

Julie then gave the Treasurer's Report. She will forward each month's figures to both Judy & Holli for this to be shared in the bulletin and Spire. This will include a comparison of this year to last. For January, last year we needed \$12,312, took in \$6,674, leaving a shortage of about \$5,638. For this year, the need was \$11,347 for expenses with \$8,160 taken in, leaving a shortage of about \$3,187. This shows us in better shape than last year at this time. We will continue to pray and prosper!!

The first item of New Business was officers for the upcoming year. Craig will remain as President, with Peggy as his Vice President. Sharon will take Alyssa "under her wings" grooming her for the position of Secretary for the following year. Julie will continue to "balance" the finances, and Michelle will again be our representative to Council. Stewardship meetings will be moved to the third Sunday of the month after church, beginning with March 15.

There was then discussion about the Financial Committee that was formed last year. It was agreed that they need to meet as the 1<sup>st</sup> step in developing a "back-up" plan for the issue with a shortage in the General Fund. More thoughts on the future handling of "memorial contributions" were shared. Possibly a brochure could be made to highlight memorial contribution options.

A suggestion was made to make cards for the pews that could be used by persons using the online giving option. It would indicate that tithes were given online and put in the collection plate.

The rental prices for the lecture hall and facilities will be reviewed to determine if the prices need to be altered.

We then turned to reviewing the Goal Sheets for future planning, moving (1) increase use of existing church facilities (2) Paving of parking lot, and (3) bring back Bible Study forward to the Goals for 2020 as well.

#### **Trustee Minutes:**

Old Business:

-The church needs to have a new fire alarm system installed. The current company has a system for \$3,100. There is a possibility that even with a new alarm system, the alarm may still go off when there is a loss of power. Trustees will investigate systems.

-The aluminum lamp post still needs to be repaired.

-Lingering water leaks seem to be ok. Any issues should be reported to trustees.

-We need to determine how we are going to fix the railing in the gathering room.

-Security cameras are operational, however, there is still some work to be done to provide Judy with a monitor in her office as well as provide her with login information to access the system through her smart phone.

New Business:

-Joe's Disposal has raised our refuse removal cost an additional \$3 per month.

-To fix the gap of the door leading from the gathering room to the old driveway the sill plate needs to be fixed.

-A light in the kitchen needs to be replaced and the dimmer switch for the Sanctuary Chandelier is broken.

#### Willing Worker:

-The quarterly meeting of the large group of Willing Workers was held on Wednesday, February 12, 2020 at 1:00PM in the Lecture Hall.

-It appeared that the roast beef dinner netted the group \$1,633.04

Old Business:

-Kay thanked the groups for helping at the Annual Meeting lunch.

-Gathering Room Cupboard Committee was rearranged and consists of: Maureen, Sherry D, Connie. -From the emails that Kandy received it appears that our group does not need Safe Serv Certification for Food Handling; however, Wendy and Gary Phillips have received the certification. Others have obtained a different kind of food certification through the Weinburg food bank: Holli Chichester, Theresa Lamberson, Tammy Stout.

#### New Business:

-Our church will host the March 4 Lenten Service. Each group needs to provide 3 pies. Kingsley group will also provide a large veggie tray. Ellen has Hawaiian punch.

-Kandy made a motion to create a position of Second Vice President. Maureen made a motion to nominate Sherry Decker for second VP. Passed.

-There was a discussion on disconnecting the phone in the Lecture Hall as most people have cell phones and the phone costs about \$28 a month. ARC uses the phone and doesn't wish anyone to check the messages (although recently there were a number on the machine). 
