

"Take Up Your Cross"

Pastor John Shaffer -- Gibson Charge UMC



Mark 8:31-38 If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me.

I find for us, people of Christian faith, living in the advantage of "this side of Easter", this text makes sense. We probably don't even flinch at the thought of the cross. In the season of Lent we are, day by day, moving towards Good Friday and Easter Sunday. Keeping a focus on those events, this text has a clear meaning for us. And, I think it had the same clear meaning for Mark's first literary audience: Just as Jesus bore his cross, the path of our lives of faith must be similar. We have our cross to bear, too. And when we bear that cross, we become more and more like the One who bore the cross on Calvary. And, that is the point of a life of faith.

However, just because we get it—and because Mark's audience around 70 AD got it—does that mean that Jesus' first listeners, the Disciples, got it? Did the people standing around hearing Jesus start to talk about his death and suffering have any clue that he would die on such a horrific instrument of punishing, tortuous death? Could they even conceive that this teacher, rabbi, healer, preacher, exorcist, and Godly man would meet such a grisly end? I boldly say, "Of course not." And so, before the disciples could even begin to wrap their heads around his death, Jesus tells THEM that they have to "take up THEIR cross." When Jesus says this here, well before Golgotha, these words would have had to sting and confuse the ears of his listeners. Take up our cross? What cross? Oh, you mean a cross of crucifixion? The Roman instrument of death for a slave?

Over the generations there have been some who clearly want to toss this passage in the "historical-Jesus-didn't-say-this circular file." They may be right. This verse would have been difficult for the Disciples to grasp pre-crucifixion. Yet, just imagine the sheer power his words held/hold for the listeners: For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it.

When we make the choice to follow Jesus it means putting our own self-survival in the backseat. The first act of following Jesus totally re-orders our priorities and principles to the way of the Kingdom. My life focus is no longer about saving my life nor about preserving my style of life. Following Jesus means that our priority is to lose our life so Christ can structure our every step. What better way to talk about that than the Cross. It's an ugly instrument not only condemning the condemned to a tortuous death but a dishonorable one. A slave's death. A death that the Hebrew Bible calls "accursed." On the cross you don't just lose your life, but you do so in a wholly unpopular, unfashionable, pauper way. You lose everything. Life. Honor. Pride. But, Jesus says that in such a loss everything is, in fact, gained. And, just in case Jesus' first audience didn't get it—because they were scandalized at the thought of plummeting those last few rungs on the social ladder—Jesus himself follows this up with showing them and US how it's done. How to lose! How to triumph. For God and His Kingdom. May it be so for us!

When it was evening, Jesus sat down at the table with the twelve disciples. While they were eating, he said, "I tell you the truth, one of you will betray me."

Greatly distressed, each one asked in turn, "Am I the one, Lord?"

He replied. "One of you who has just eaten from this bowl with me will betray me. For the Son of Man must die, as the Scriptures declared long along. But how terrible it will be for the one who betrays him. It would be far better for that man if he had never been born!"

Judas, the one who would betray him, also asked. "Am I the one?"

And Jesus told him, "You have said it." Matthew 26:20-25, NLT (New Living Translation)

I always struggle with Judas, the destined bad guy. As we enter the halfway point of Lent this year, I realize Judas reminds me of Shane, a fellow grade school classmate of mine. Shane would often get into trouble—serious trouble. As a boy of eight, nine and ten, Shane was always "the other guy," or "the bad guy." Even though we were in the same room for several years in a row, he was far from me because I was one of the goody-goody kids who must have gotten into some trouble sometimes. But me? I was never Shane.

Now I realize I am like Shane. We are all like Shane. In turn, we are all like Judas. "Am I the one, Lord?" is a question we can all ask. Spoken further, our question sounds like this. "Am I the one who betrays you? Am I the bad one who gets it wrong, who sends you to the cross each year?

I know the answer to these questions. Speaking for yourself, you know the answer, too.

Yes. We are all sinful. We all betray Jesus.

Throughout his earthly ministry, Jesus' polarity of language is stunning, striking, powerful and poignant. In this passage, he sets into juxtaposition the polarizing terms dying and being born. This is no accident. Each year, Lent speaks to our death so that we can live again—or live anew—in Christ, the redeemer of our sinful souls.

Being a betrayer is heavy. It's ugly.

As I write this, I am in the slow, aching process of adopting five foster children who are full siblings. By court order, the children's biological parents are granted visits with the children for an hour twice a month. I minimally interact with these two during the visits yet become unglued each time. Literally. Truly. Unglued.

This should not unglue me because I am not a super parent. Somehow however, at least for tiny windows of time, I think I am I am at least a *good* parent. Oh, sure, we have golden moments as a family. True, mountaintop experiences define us. The kids who are old enough to go to school have become exemplary students.

Just like with classmate Shane, I come off as so goody-goody in comparison to the two biological parents. Interestingly, most often this is my comparison.

It is incredible how far I am from perfect. Instead, I have to own the address my own glass house. None of us have it all together.

Like me, you have a place in this conversation. We can all ask, "Am I the one, Jesus?"

He will answer. "Yes, you are the one."

I will think he means that I am the bad guy (because I am). However, in that word way of his, Jesus will mean that I am the one—I am the one he died for on the day the world forever changed. Perfect, blameless, and forever loving, Jesus is the one who took my sins away. Jesus is the one who takes my sins away.

Yes, each one of us betrays the Son of Man. Equally, and with a liberation we need to share more of each day, the one who rose from the grave and now sits forever at the right hand of God, the Father, rejoices. He beams.

It was a warm spring night. The full moon placed shadows on the rocky landscape of a Palestinian garden. There he lay, his nose inhaling the scent of the dank moist earth.

Splotches of moist red fluid blotted his sweat soaked shirt, and he was crying. This is what we see. What we hear is the voice of one in dialogue with none other than the Creator of the universe, his father. They had talked many times through the nights of his three year stint. But this was different. He was praying.

Praying, not for His beloved chicks to be brought under the wings of the hen.

Praying, not for the skill of being the Incarnation of God for the next day.

Praying, not for the oneness of his disciples.

He was praying for Himself. From the marrow of his youthful bones, he was invoking out of sheer sense of dread.

The fellowship and ritual of the Passover victory meal consumed a few hours ago was erased from his recollection. The friends he enlisted to accompany him were not there. All that could be seen was the horror of an assignment that at that point seemed unconquerable. Not even the motivation of a warrior angel could be heard in his ears.

All he saw was: that job.

All he heard was the shouts of mobs.

All he felt was searing pain soon to pounce on his emaciated body.

It was the dread that swallowed up his personality and spit out it out again. Maybe the terror thundered upon him, like a lightning bolt in a spring storm and it pierced his very soul. And there, in that darkness, there was only Him and His father...and He was crying. Unlike his accomplices whose choice was to "sleep off" the blackness of that moment, his taut facial muscles were planted into the ground.

What is it that you dread? Name a time in your life when the definition of the word "anticipation" was a consuming anxiety that choose never to leave you. As your constant companion, you just can't stop thinking about it, you find no joy in no moment that you are awake. Because of it, your landscape is bare of any of life's joys. Your attention is quite focused. It is only that task that you know you must face, and you wonder, worry, and obsess. Please, Lord, take this cup from me.

Then maybe you taste the wine in the cup. In spite of its bitterness, you are, for maybe only a fleeting moment, able to lift your head and see the plan, or at least the God who is the planner. And in the broader scene of your pilgrimage, you have learned to trust that cup bearer. You recall the great victories that He has given you in the past. You look anew at the victory that happened on that night on the Mt. of Olives, and your barbell is lightened, your horror is diminished, and you say it, just like He said it:

"It is enough; the hour has come; behold, the Son of Man is being betrayed into the hands of sinners. Get up, let us be going; ...

And go you will! And, like Him, you will drink it all in...in victory.

A different Lent, a new Easter

Michael Hopkins, pastor in Surrey, England, wrote the following on February 17, 2021. "At the best of times, and 2021 is far from the best of times, I've always felt that boiling down a spiritual season to giving up chocolate or booze is the best example there is of totally missing the point. It doesn't adequately embrace the nature and meaning of Lent, and as is typical in the highly individualistic culture of 21st century Britain, it shifts the focus of Lent to a "me and God" experience based on what I am doing for God."

Hopkins continues. "What I mean is that we run the risk of engaging with Lent by saying: 'I can suffer like Jesus by giving up chocolate or Facebook or coffee so I can be more like Jesus!' No self-deprivation will place us in the same universe with the experience of Jesus, much less in the same room with Jesus. The ultimate irony is that our spiritual ancestors of the Protestant Reformation repudiated the practices of the time precisely because such practices focused on personal self-justification and not on the grace of God. Nothing is supposed to be about us working to ensure our well-being or salvation with God. If you think you need to give up chocolate or Facebook or booze or coffee, by all means give them up, but don't do it for forty days and then take them up again, thinking it will somehow earn God's pleasure."

Without negating Hopkins' theological stance here, I do admire those connected to the church here in Harford who have taken on the ritualistic practice of taking something away during the forty days. This Lenten practice is significant to those who practice self-sacrifice because it draws them closer to Christ, which is, after all, the essence of Lent. The Lenten hymn, "Draw Me Nearer," is intended to do just that—draw us nearer. How does this happen if we do not understand, at least partially, the sufferings of Christ? The point needs to be made that it is Christ who suffered, not us. By his wounds we are healed, not our own.

I share Hopkins' thoughts for two reasons. First, any Lenten practice that draws us closer to Christ can be extended throughout the year. These practices, which we will most likely fail at doing AT LEAST a couple times in a single year, do draw us ever more closely to the theology of grace.

Second, I am drawn to his understanding of Lent, 2021. In the same writing I quoted from, Hopkins shares that, "In the last year we have given up more than we ever wished for longer than we would have wished." He speaks to the overwhelming loss of people and the loss of how we have lived our lives. Consider our once common, typical, everyday interactions that, if not gone for good, won't come back as they did before the pandemic. Aligning with Hopkins here, I suggest that maybe this past year has been 365 days of Lent.

Enough Lent. Enough loss. The point of Lent is to draw us through our own forty days of being in the wilderness with a new understanding—and a new appreciation—for what, exactly, Easter is.

Let's begin to live a new Easter, an Easter like everyone in the thick of this pandemic can, in fact, imagine. This Easter, this heaven-touched earth euphoria, looks at a glance like the Easter secular marketers sell. Easter is actually the Easter we are all are supposed to have. It's the Easter where we know we are alive after an isolation like Jesus had with Satan in the desert.

I am not saying we are skipping into our spring and summer months scot-free, or that the pandemic will be over. We may have many more months ahead of us that have been like the months just behind us. But in this Easter, we will be reminded again that life is good, life is valuable, and the connections we had with people pre-virus make post-virus life all the more meaningful and all the more sacred.

We are going to live an Easter, a new Easter, because Easter 2021, unlike any Easter any of us have ever experienced in the past, makes new life—resurrected life—not just understandable, but amazing and wonderful. We will know what it feels like to have that stone rolled away because seemingly similar stones have been in our way. Our Jesus is with us! Our, once dead for our sins, Jesus is alive! He is alive!

Truly a resurrection, why Harford First Congregational celebrates Easter with in-person worship

Everyone who has experienced even a mild rough patch in their marriage knows what work it takes to be in a relationship. We, the Harford First Congregational Church are in a relationship with each other. The shepherd in me came out during our last deacon's meeting when the top discussion point was to reopen the sanctuary during Easter or, because of Covid and its limitations, to close completely and move to virtual only. The protector in me came out. The guardian. The host. The question, "What if..." kept rolling in my mind, only each time it did something changed. "What if we get someone sick?" "What if we miss a safety step?" "What if someone wanting to worship arrives without a mask and a self-proclaimed need to not wear one?" "What if, as blessed as we have been in safely worshipping so far we go too far, and the very worst part of the pandemic unknowingly enters the double glass doors this Easter at 10 AM and actually causes great and lasting harm?"

Some of you are likely thinking I am making too big a deal of this. If so, let me ask you, are you willing to put any guest of yours at risk for any reason?

As we deacons considered safety and options carefully and slowly, words came out of my mouth that aren't mine. Vigilant and thoughtful, the protector in me was well beyond present at this meeting. Why? My answer is clear. When you are in worship, I want you to do just that—worship! I don't want anyone at any time during any service to stop and think, "Well, gee, this doesn't seem safe." We come to God to glorify, not be scared, concerned, or distracted.

Given the challenges our postal system is experiencing, I am not sure if you'll be reading this ahead of Easter, April 4th, or after. If this is after, please keep in mind that your goal in worship is not your comfort; it is your relationship with God. And because we are also in a relationship with each other, the comfort—and, above all, the safety—of those around you. As you have seen if you're in house or online, Craig Stout is now demonstrating how to wear our masks *over* our noses. Yes, more and more of us are getting vaccinated, and yes, the choir in its current formation will sing with their masks on, so Easter 2021 has a meaning all its own. So, what is the meaning of Easter 2021, you ask?

The Easter meaning never changes, though the years do. As we live into the Easter message on and beyond April 4th, we carry ourselves in the hope of a resurrected Christ who, by His death and His life, promises us not death but eternal life. The cross, the stone in front of the tomb, and the grave empty are our poignant, unquestionable signs that there is no condemnation for those who believe in Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior. Christ has risen! We who follow Him will rise, too!

I keep seeing the year 2021 in print. I like these four numbers in sequence because I see 20 and then 21. It's an order. It's a moving forward. The year 2021 as moving us from one place, the pandemic, to the next place, life beyond the pandemic. As Christians, we are in relationship with each other and with the world around us. Relationships, as you remember from the top of this page, take work. This work can seem burdensome, perhaps even overwhelming at times. But the work of glorifying our God through His Son, Jesus Christ, is the ONLY work we should be doing. Yes, we may be employed or busy as grandparents (or somewhere in between), but our work—our ultimate work—is drawing others to Christ. As better, brighter days are ahead of us at some point, our congregation, through your presence near and far, has this amazing potential: to become better and brighter. We can love more. Feed more. Care more. Pray more. Laugh more. Listen more. Trust more. Reach more. Touch more. Encourage more. We can be more not in ourselves but in our service to, and our love of, the Giver of Life Himself, our resurrected Lord and Savior.

20...21... And 2022 is a year of even more life, resurrected life, as we reach through the church into the close and the wider communities God keeps calling us to serve not meekly but triumphantly, not in our spirit but His!

Trustee Meeting Minutes—March 8, 2021

Old Business:

Emergency Food Distribution

Hop Bottom Fire Hall

Paula Smith, the Summer Lunchbox CEO, noticed that some of the extra Summer Lunchbox food would expire before summer 2021. She got with her church's food pantry (Hop Bottom United Methodist Church) and offered a food distribution in December 2020, once a week, on Wednesday. The first few weeks 25-30 families were served. The last week in December over 100 families came for relief food.

The employment situation and food situation continue to grow worse here in the MountainView School District. The Missionary Group is asking the congregation to join them in collecting food items for this food distribution. Many of the people served by the Summer Lunch Program are coming asking for help.

The food items are different than the Weinberg Food Bank. The items are selected specifically to meet the needs of school age children. The list of needed items are below. The Peanut Butter collection barrel will be set on the porch by the double glass doors for food drop off every day that weather permits.



Community Health Evangelism (CHE) Update

Missionary Group and Harford First Congregational Church support this mission

- 1)We distributed 1240 food packets in 26 communities to 1240 families impacted by the hurricanes also to 7440 people in the surrounding areas.
- 2) 20,000 reusable masks were made by CHE women and distributed to people.
- 3) Contribution to the widows of pastors who have died as a result of the pandemic. 50 widows were offered pastoral counseling and consolation, with a food packet, worth \$150. This impacted 200 people.
- 4) The International prayer ministry Wake Up Deborah, gave 6 workshops last year, using Zoom, so they were open to the nation. Topics were Good Stewardship, Conflict Resolution, Addiction, and Cyber Bullying, Family Violence, Walking with Christ, and Why Evangelize. These reached 200 women.
- 5) Distribution of seeds, corn, beans, and sorghum, to 70 families in the areas affected by the hurricanes in the northern Caribbean region. This is an agricultural area. 20 lbs of each seed type was given to 20 families. This will help to resolve some of the food problems in the area.
- 6) Attention to the Children's CHE ministry through Children's Canteens, with academic support: 1100 nutritional food packets were distributed to lower the levels of child malnutrition in the communities, benefitting 10 communities on the national level, who serve 1800 children 3 times a week.
- 7) Distribution of construction materials 1200 sheets of zinc and 240 lbs of nails to 120 families who lost their roofs during the hurricane. Each family received 10 sheets of zinc (corrugated iron) and 2 lbs of nails. This helped a total of 720 people in these families.
- 8) We partnered with World Vision in Nicaragua to distribute 530 packets which included clothes, backpacks, and school materials, to be distributed to 530 families, thus impacting a total of 3,180 people.
- 9) Distribution of ceramic floor tiles for churches, as part of our relationship with churches, we were able to deliver 1000 meters of flooring to be installed in 2 child canteens, as well as 3 churches.
- 10) Distribution of 70 rolls of fabric to make masks, purses, and other crafts in the CHE communities and churches involved in the CHE ministry.
- 11) Distribution of household goods to 520 families who lost everything in their homes (saucepans, silverware, dishes etc) because of the hurricanes in the northern Atlantic area.
- 12) 6 half scholarships were awarded to 6 CHE leaders, which gave them \$27.50 monthly, for a total of \$2000 annually, as part of wholistic support for the individual growth of community leaders.
- 13) The Evangelism and Discipleship program in the Children's CHE ministry served 1100 children, who also received the Samaritan's Purse Christmas boxes.
- 14) We redesigned all the files of CHE lessons, and contextualized the material for presentations in workshops in the communities and institutions who are working with CHE on the national level.

In spite of the pandemic, the Lord, by His infinite mercy, enabled us to accomplish all of the activities we have described. In addition, we were able to establish relationships with pastors of different denominations, with whom we were praying week after week for national and world crisis. We thank God for the hard work by each member of the CHE board team, as well as each one of the community members, and donors. Your offerings for this wholistic ministry have been invested for the purposes for which they were donated, and we have managed to impact people in different communities and churches.


